On motion of Alderman Collins, the Council proceeded to the election to fill the office of inspector general of timber and lumber, left vacant by the resignation of Alderman T. J. Mackey. Alderman Collins nominated Alderman David Barrow. The result of the balloting was as follows:

David Barrow received fourteen votes, and Alderman L. T. Potter one. Alderman Barrow was declared elected.

Brick and Wooden Buildings, reported favorably upon the petitions of the Plymouth Chuich, Mr. Raoni and Alderman Howard. The report was adopted.

Alderman Collins introduced a bill providing that the salary of the city atterney, D. T. Corbin, be increased from \$800 to \$2000 per annum. The oll received a first reading.

Alderman McKinlay introduced a bill to amend the ordinance to aid in rebuilding the waste places of the city. It provides for the removal of all restrictions upon erecting wooden buildings. It received a first reading. The bill to raise supplies for the fiscal year end

ing December 31st, 1871, (published yesterday) was taken up for a second reading, which it received, also a third reading; its title was then changed to that of an ordinance, and it was ordered to be engrossed for ratification at the next meeting.

A recess of five minutes was taken in order to engross the bill.

At the expiration of the recess the ordinance vas presented "as duly and correctly engrossed," and was duly ratified.

The bill to fix the salary of the city attorney received its second and third reading, its title was changed to that of an ordinance, and it ordered to be engrossed for ratification at the next meeting. Alderman Hampton was not in favor of inreasing the salary of the city attorney when there was a move on foot to cut down the pay of

the police. The bill to regulate the police force was called up for a second reading. It provides that there shall be one captain, whose pay shall be \$1500 per annum, two lieutenants, \$1200 each; two sergeants, \$800 each; seventy privates, \$720 each; four outdoor sentinels, \$600 each; two hestlers \$600 each; six steeplemen, \$360 each. The amount requisite to pay off the force will be about \$95,-000 yearly.

The Mayor read a communication from Lieutenant Taft, of the police force, stating that, as Alderman Collins had made allusions to him in the caucus the night before, which affected his character as an officer and a gentleman, and as the remarks of the Alderman had been freely discussed upon the streets, he would demand an investigation.

Alderman Collins stated that he thought that what was said in caucus should be kept secret. Alderman Greene objected to the communica tion being discussed, and stated that he would withdraw his police bill, and have nothing further to do with it. He then retired.

At this point, Council adjourned

Il Trovatore at the Academy of Music 1: Trovatore is a favorite opera, although it has been hummed and strummed to death on every plane and band organ in and out of civilization, and its announcement for last night drew to the Academy of Music an audience both large and fashionable.

Miss McCulloch, whose powers are better adapted to tragic thar comic opera, acted and sang with vigor, and, especially in the lastt act, was fully equal to the requirements of the dramatic situation.
