With favorable weather during the coming crop year, there are good reasons to hope that the result will be in adrance of anything since the close of hostilitles: but much depends upon atmospheric conditions, and unless favored with suitable weather, heavy supplies of manures, improved implements and beter organized labor, will fail to produce the increase that should fairly be looked for.
