THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS .- We learn that the public schools of this city were yesterday formally transferred to the new board of commissioners, lately appointed by Governor Scott. Fourteen years have elapsed since the present s. : tem of schools was introduced into this city. and during the whole of that period political influences have never been allowed to enter into the election of the board of commissioners. A new era has now dawned upon our -city and State, and the same pernicious influences, which have for the past few years brought ruin and disgrace upon our unhappy country, have at last been brought to bear upon this important public interest. The citins of Charleston have, at great expense, erected buildings second to none in the United States; and we trust that the new school authorities will not allow the reputation which our schools have won to be destroyed by pre-

cipitate or unwise action. The property which this board holds in trust for the citizens is valued at more than \$100 .-000, nearly the whole of which has been seen mulated since the introduction of the present system. Over twenty thousand children have been enrolled in the schools during this period. and these pupils are now found in all the walks of life.
