TRIAL JUSTICES.—A few days since we published a list of twenty trial justices for the City and County of Charleston. Since then R. H. DeHay, L. Bunch and W. A. Cannon have been appointed—the latter in the place of P. N. A. Peacheneau, removed.

ARRIVAL OF THE SAVANNAH BAND.—The Washington Cornet Band, composed of colored men of Savannah, and which accompanied the Savannah Base Ball Club to this city twice last summer, arrived here Sunday night, and yesterday afternoon discoursed some excellent music on the Battery.

DEAD.—Wilson Frierson, who was severely injured on the down train of the Northeastern Railroad last Friday morning, died Sunday night at the City Hospital, whither he had been conveyed. Coroner Whiting held an inquest yesterday, and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the above facts.

PARADE.—Several of the colored military companies paraded through the principal streets yesterday afternoon. We learn that the object of the parade was to escort Gov. Scott from the South Carolina Railroad depot, but, he having declined to come to the city at present, they concluded to parade through the streets.

ORGANIZATION OF A HOOK AND LADDER COMPANY.—A number of colored citizens have organized themselves into a company, to be called the Hook and Ladder Company, No. 3, and have elected the following officers: William T. Effe, foreman; William E. Burke, assistant foreman; P. B. Morris, secretary; A. V. Brodie, treasurer. The company propose getting the necessary apparatus at an early day.

THE BRAZILIAN EXILES.—The ladies in charge of the Confederate Widows' Home, in addition to the acknowledgments made by others, desire to express their thanks to the friends who generously assisted them in caring for the returned emigrants from Brazil, especially to Mr. Jacob Small, Mr. Julius Ostendorf, Mr. J. Capel, Mr. James Dunning, Mr. T. O'Brien, and the ladies of the Mutual Aid Association for a liberal deduction upon articles of clothing purchased.

THE CHARLESTON TRUCK FARMERS.—The Norfolk Virginian says: "Standing on the wharf of the Baltimore steamer, Friday, we saw about a hundred boxes of tomatoes, which had been shipped from Charleston, S. C., to Baltimore, and although brought with the speed of the railroad, more than three-fourths of them had rotted. Tomatoes seem to rot faster this year than ever knew them before. We asked an old, experienced trucker the cause of it, and he informed us that it was on account of the long dry spell which delayed them, and the heavy rains upon them ripening them suddenly." Why do not the truck farmers try the Express Company if the freight trains are too slow? A special rate might be made on application.

FIRE ACCIDENT.—Late Saturday afternoon a fire was heard issuing from a kitchen in Rose lane. Those hearing the screams rushed in the building, and found a woman named Violet Washington on fire. The flames were soon extinguished, but not before the woman was severely burned. She was removed to No. 633 King street, where she lingered in excruciating agony until late Sunday night, when death relieved her of her sufferings. An inquest was held and a verdict of accidental death rendered. It is believed that she attempted to make her fire burn more rapidly by pouring kerosene oil upon it, and that the fire was communicated to the contents in the can, causing an explosion and setting the unfortunate woman on fire.
