

A MODEL MAGISTRATE.

McCLELLANVILLE, S. C., May 25, 1870. To his Excellency, Governor R. K. Scott: Sir—Some six months or more, since, upon the resignation of one of our magistrates, and the retirement of another from this parish, we sent up to headquarters a petition, signed by men of both colors, for the appointment of one whose integrity, urbanity and intelligence were unquestioned.

In response, you sent us, as Trial Justice, a quondam bootblack; a notorious stirrer up of strife among us for years past; a freedman, whose incompetency is only equalled (as usual) by his assurance and intolerable insolence. Upon the slightest charge, and sometimes upon none at all, are men of the Anglo-Saxon race hauled up before this mimic judge, whose Solon attitude would but provoke laughter were it accompanied by even tolerable consideration for those before him. We intend no threat; but earnestly call upon you to abate a nuisance, by removing from office one who has notoriously abused his trust—and who yet glories in the name of "Billy Pinckney."

For this reason, he proposes an important addition to the militia force, and selects the negroes from the class which is most ignorant of the rights of citizens under the law, and therefore most likely to render an unquestioning obedience to all his commands. He thus makes himself responsible for any bloodshed which may result.
