Statistics in reference to the sanitary condition of the London needle-women have been published, from which it appears that the mean age of women generally is 54.1 years; that of needle-women is only 36.4. Out of one thousand, needle-women, four hundred and had kept the treasury empty. But no such thirty-eight die from consumption, and one hundred and three from fevers; out of one thousand shop-keepers, one hundred and twenty-seven die from consumption, and thirty-seven from fevers. In 1861, it is stated that there were 127,131 females in London engaged in various branches of needle-work, of whom 31,000 were under twenty years of age.

-The raising of sunken vessels by balloons has recently been in course of experiment at Liverpool. Operations were commenced on a sunken steam-tug. Thirty-six balloons are used, four calculated to raise forty tons each, twenty to raise twenty tons each, and twelve to raise ten tons each-giving a total lifting power of 680 tons. The empty balloons are combined with a number of charged gas generators, and attached to an apparatus which is bolted to the sides of the vessel. The generastors are expected to furnish sufficient hydrogea gas to the balloons to give them lifting power to raise the vessels to the surface. The result of the experiment has not yet been announced.
