ARORGIA.

The Largest Steamship on the Atlantic Coast Service-Rooms for One Hundred and Fifty Passengers-Palatial Deck State-Rooms - The "Empire State" Complimented.

The arrival yesterday of this large-sized and magnificently appointed ocean steamship at our port, is a happy coincidence, in connection with our unusually heavy cotton receipts from the West, and the immense amount of merchandise freights, which, for the past six weeks, has tested our steamships and our railroads. on the main lines, to all parts of the cotton belt. The Georgia has all the cotton awaiting her that Captain Crowell can, by the best management, stow away and the port of Charleston has already, and to ar rive, cotton enough for several more Georgias, the estimated dispatch to New York the current week being 9000 to 10,000 bales. So we contemplate with a double pleasure both the quantity to be forwarded, and the facilities at hand to meet the emergen-

cy of trafic at our now growing seaport. The Georgia left New York on Thursday after noon, with a large freight and forty passengers and reached her pier early on Sunday morning. She is commanded by Captain Sidney Crowell, an experienced shipmaster, and is in point of tonnage and elegant appointments the most costly and commodious steamship on the coast. We are able to make up the following brief description of this new candidate for popular favor, and which has, with delicate propriety, been named in comp'iment to our big sister State across the "Isun-

diga." which has been built at the yard of Messrs. Wm. Cramp & Sons, Philadelphia, is of iron throughout, 285 feet long, 36 feet beam, and 21 feet depth of hold. Four heavy kelsons run fore and aft the ship, on either side of the main keel, insuring a trength which seems solid enough to bid defiance to storms, however severe. The frames are of heavy angle iron, 18 inches apart, with reverse bars on each frame. The plating is % inch thick up to load line, and % and % inch thick above, all double rivetted. The entire hull is divided into three water-tight compartments, which grorm of onstruction now meets with general approval.

ENGINE, BOILER AND SURFACE CONDENSER. The engine is of 1000 horse-power, and of the nost approved build, with two return tubular bollers, supplied with fresh water from a surface condenser of large capacity. NEW PATENT WHEELS.

In order to insure speed, the improved feathering bucket wheel has been adapted at great exense; these wheels are used exclusively on all he fast mail steamships in the English mail service, and their merit is in the maintenanca of iniform revolutions in the heaviest weather.

THE CABIN ARRANGEMENTS have been all designed and made by Messrs. Rouland & Co., of New York, and are entirely different from all other steamships we have seen, and in point of arrangement, elegance and comfort, are fally up to the requirements of the times. The state-rooms afford first-class accommodations for one hundred and fifty passengers, and embrace upper and lower salo vns. running the entire length of the main deck, on which all the rooms are located. There are two bridal-rooms of larger size, with handsome appointments, and about sixty other commodious state-rooms, in each of which are a double bed and single berth, supplied with hair nattresses, on spring frames; carpets, china linen and blankets being all of the finest material. There are also in convenient locations a social hall, smoking-room and bath-room. In the latter, passengers can order "hot or cold," "fresh or sea water baths" at their pleasure.

THE STEWARD'S APARTMENTS are on an extensive and complete scale, both for cooking purposes and the keeping in order of the elaborate and costly outfit of so large a vessel. Mr. Booth, formerly of the Tennessee, is in charge of this department, and has already established a reputation with bon-vivants which will be put to the test and; we doubt not, fully met onthis new steamship.

A TRIO OF FINE IRON STEAMSHIPS. This useful steam line, which is contributing so much to the development of our port, is managed n Charleston by Messrs. Wagner, Huger & Co., and Mr. Wm. A. Coursenay, and comprises the Georgia, Clyde and South Carolina; three splendid vessels of light draft, and so great a carriage capacity as to have attracted public attention in a remarkable manner.
