-Gold closed in New York yesterday at 10%. -Cotton was unsettled and lower; uplands 161/2

-England is beginning to acknowledge New York as the leader of fashions. The London publishers, to whom a prominent metropolitan modiste has furnished steel fashion plates for some time past, advised her recently by cable to increase their original order one-third, in lieu of Parisian styles, American designs being preferred

-A number of French officers, taken prisone at Sedan, were sitting at a restaurant at Berlin, when some private Prussian soldiers entered, and, as all other tables were full, sat down at their table. The arrogant lieutenants took of sence at what they deemed an insult to their epaulettes. So one of them asked one of the privates, who belonged to the landwehr, in an insulting manner for his name. "My name is Prince T___," was the reply, "at present serving my country as a private. Give me yours, sir, so that I may know whom to chastise as soon as you are

A California miner, who last spring emigrat that on arriving there the California scenes of '49 were reproduced. "The river was lined with rockers, tents and miners of all kinds, color, sex and size, for a mile on both sides. At least 800 miners were at work, whole families, men, women and washing the dirt, while the women and children were sitting around tables and sorting the pebbles that have been washed for diamonds " One parfifty paces each way, and less than two feet deep, 150 more had been taken out near by. They ranged from % to 63 karats weight, and one of 40 karats is valued at £9500. The gravel is dug down to the clay bed, the dirt sifted, and the pebbles carefully washed in a cradle and then sorted, a handful at a time. The negroes are being taught to sort, and the blacker they are the more honest. Whenever they have a little white blood in them,

they will steal. -Among the improvements of modern war, methods for providing defensive cover for soldiers in action have a prominent place. New Publications.

MARGARET: A Tale of the Real and the Ideal, Blight and Bloom. By Sylvester Judd. Bos-ton: Roberts Brothers.

We hope we shall not be thought uncharitable when we say that the author of this book appears to us to be crazy. It is the only hypothesis by which we can account for the mass of incoherent jargon which comes to us with the magniloquent title above quoted. It is impossible to disentangle the slender thread of story from the heterogeneous collection of sesquipedalian words "which stagger under their own "weight" through the four hundred closely printed pages. We shall not, therefore, attempt the hopeless task, but will content ourselves with indicating a few of the leading features of this wonderful production. "Margaret," the heroine, is first introduced to us "phantasmagorically," as the author puts it, an infant, playing in the grass near its parents' cottage, in New England; and, in the first chapter, we have one or two suggestions of what is really the only merit we have been able to discover in Mr. Judd's writing-a certain sympathy with outward nature which shows itself, every now and then, in bits of fresh and vivid descriptionchildren. The men were picking, shoveling and The rest of the book is comprised under the ostensible divisions of Margaret's youth and womanhood, and, except that it grows more unintelligible, as "the Real and the Ideal, "Blight and Bloom" alternately predominate in the heroine's development, does not differ much from its opening promise. Here is a specimen, taken at random, of the ordinary conversation of one of Margaret's friends, Master Elliman:

> "Those super-auricular capillary appendages, hardened with pomatum, to what shall we liken them, or with what similitude shall we set them forth? They are like the eaves of a Chinese temple, or, in the vernacular of your brother, Nimrod, they are like a sheep's tail; yea, verily. But by a paradox, id est, by digressing and returning, we will keep in the straight track. The deacon, the parson and the master, a megalosplanchnotical triad, have recommended Hale's Spelling Book. Enoch was a pupil of mine, and, though grown sanctiloquent of late, he always knew how to say the right thing, as his book abundantly teaches. Webster, moreover, advertises us that & is no letter; the goal of every breathless, whip-fearing, abed-arian valorous strife the high-sounding Amperyand no letter Mehercule! You apocopate that from the alphabet, and Deacon Hadlock will apocopate you from the school; yea, verily."

The author informs us, in the preface. that "Master Elliman has been called a sort "of diluted imitation of Dominie Sampson!" Shade of the Wizard of the North, turn not back from the spirit land to avenge the desecration! No one but Mr. Judd would ever have dreamed of the comparison.

When Margaret first meets her future lover, (which she does in a chapter headed, in strict conformity with the heterogeneousness of the whole book, "Margaret-Mr. "Evelyn-Christ!") they thus discourse with each other:

Margaret. "Am I not an automatic vegetable-a witch-hazei in moccasins? The master says I am of the order Bipeds, and in species Simulacreus; distinguished by thirtytwo teeth, and having the superior extremities terminated by a hand, which is susceptible of a greater variety of motions than that of any other animal, and is remarkably prehensile, &c., &c. * * * For my own part, I incline to the sylvan analogy, only my clothes are not half so durable as this bark, nor my hair so becoming as the leaves, and I must undress myself at night, and take to my bed, while the trees sleep standing and unbooded. Then, what a pother we make about eating, while the tree lives on its own breath, and, easier than a duck, muddles for nourishment with its

Whereto the lover profoundly responds: "You will not overlook the mind, the spiritthe fabled Psyche, the inner voluntary life, the diversifier of action, the possibility of achievement, the gubernator of matter, the annotator of the universe, the thinking, willing, loving aspiration and submission, retrospection and prospection, smiling and weeping, speech and silence, right and wrong, art, poefry, music, heroism and seif-renunciation, the self-con-

"She also possesses much of the Universal "Heart." In this remarkable condition we gladly leave her. She is evidently quite beyond the reach of criticism, and has "out-"soared the shadow of our night" to an extent which makes it quite impossible for us to follow her.

In one of the critical notices which the publishers have kindly affixed to the book as a guide to our judgment, we are told that "Margaret will be one of the antiquary's "text-books." It may be so, and, until that time shall come, we deposit it in undisturbed rest upon our highest shelf.
