The business of furnishing arms to the nation a now at war in Europe has lately attained immense proportious. Two weeks ago four steamers went to France from New York direct, with three hundred thousand muskets and equipments; last week the Ontario went to Cowes for orders with about one hundred thousand more; to-day the Pereire sails with a very large amount, and as soon as she leaves the Erie is to be sent round from Boston to load with the same material. The Prench have received from New York nearly a million of small arms, besides some cancon and a large number of pistols, sabres and cartridges; and from England probably two hundred thousand more. This large exportation of arms and ammunition has hal the effect of making business very active in these particular branches of trade, and many of the factories are running on extra time to try and keep up with their orders. We have also shipped a considerable number of American torpedoes to both parties, but rierely for experimental purposes. If they prove satisfactory, large orders will be forwarded, and manufacturers are now making them in anticipation of the proposed demand. The war has een quite profitable to the dealers in arms and ammunition, and will make business very lively for some time to come among the manufacturers.

-The agent sent to China by the Planters' As

sociation of Honolulu to procure coolies has made a report, from which it appears that this class of labor cannot be obtained at as low rates as has been supposed. The planters at Honolulu were willing to pay six dollars a month wages and expenses, but the agent states that the increased demand for coolies for Callao and for the United States has raised the wages to at least sixteen dollars a month. The colonial government at Hong Kong does not permit "contract men" to be shipped from the port, and the agent, after visiting several ports, failed to obtain laborers at the prices he was authorized to give. At Macao, all contracts for labor abroad are made for eight years, and only men between the ages of twenty and forty years are allowed to be shipped. The coolles, also, are not disposed to enterinto contracts, the most of them refusing to be taken to Callao, Peru, and fearing that they will be taken to that place, in breach of the agreement to be sent elsewhere. The preliminary expenses in procuring coolles are very heavy amounting to over \$150. The items are as follows: Brokerage, from \$35 to \$65; government tax \$6; advance to the coolle, \$8; clothes and blankets, \$5 25; inspection fee, 50 cents; food consumed before leaving, \$2; food during voy age, \$8 to \$10; doctor's and interpreter's fees, \$1 50; head coolle broker's fees, \$3 to \$5 extra, making a total of from \$90 to \$100. To this must be added exchange, \$17, and passage money, \$20 to \$40. It is stated that coolie laborers landed at Havana or at Callao cost fully \$200 each, and that the contracts are readily disposed of at those places for \$400, in consequence of the mortality on the voyage. The wages paid at Havana amount to \$4 a week, and the cost of the coolles, it is estimated, is never less than \$20 to \$22 a month. It is believed that these high rates will prevent the employment of coolies in the South, but, at the same time, it is stated that responsible Chinese houses in San Francisco, having greater facilities, can obtain a better class of agricultural laborers from the interior of China than can be found in the large cities and seaports without paying the heavy brokerage demanded of private agents sent out from this

The Eastern Question.

Making full allowance for the coloring given to important news by the London correspondents of the American press, there seems to be no doubt that the Eastern question is causing serious trouble in the British Cabinet. From the beginning it was predicted that the Gladstone Cabinet would split up when the united Liberals had accomplished the disestablishment of the Irish Church and had adopted a scheme of popular education. All the ministers are Liberais; but there are degrees in Liberalism, and the difference of opinion between Lord Granville and Mr. Bright, for instance, is as great as the difference between the firstnamed minister and the more advanced members of the opposition. The Liberal party is divided into two wings-the Radical wing being led by Mr. Bright, as opposed to not consent to a war with Russia whatever of them can avoid a resignation. It was already resigned, but this news lacks confirmation. The Cabinet meeting to be held to-day will, in all probability, decide whether the Gladstone Cabinet shall remain in power. The work of completing the United States census has proceeded so rapidly of late that a sufficiently exact statement may be made for determining the relative strength of the States to each other in the Congress to be next elected, which will meet in March, 1872. sists of 243 members. Assuming that number to remain unchanged, upon the basis of a population of 38,471,998, the ratio of the new representation would be 158,324. Dividing the population of each State by this ratio, and giving members to the States having the largest fractions sufficient to make a total of 243 members, the distribution would stand as follows:

#### A Scene from the Forty Thieves.

It seems that the comical trial scene in the well-known burlesque of the Forty Thienes is to be played "in real earnest" in Cofumbia, with the difference, however, that the Hasserac of the occasion craves a seat in the gorgeous Senate chamber at Washington, while the judge, whose opinions oscillate with the alternating preponderance of rival money bags, is the honorable body known as the Radical General Assembly of South Carolina.

The money-bags of Chief Justice Mose contain just \$30,000, and are supplemented by the filial fondness and smooth tongue of the Speaker of the House. Mr. Attorney-General Chamberlain goes as high as \$35,000, to which may be added the money value of the adroit manipulations of Mr. Timothy Hurley. All this intimidates Senator Robertson, who is in doubt whether \$40,000 would prove a profitable investment. At all events, he ought to know.
