SENATOR DIETRICH BIEMANN.

A German Pioneer in South Carolina-What Industry and Energy may Achieve-Walhalia-Interesting Reminiscences of its Growth.

(Translated for THE NEWS from the Cincinnati Deutsche Pioneer.]

Merits can neither be measured by results nor by the influence which a man may exercise upon his immediate surroundings, nor by the esteem bestowed by his grateful fellow-cinzens. The trials and difficulties which he had to overcome, and the opposition he had to encounter in the combat of life, should be taken into consideration. While we certainly shall not withhold our

come and the opposition he had to encounter in the combat of life, should be taken into consideration. While we certainly shall not withhold our homage from the man who; was bern under the most favorable auspices, who from his position and birth has had every means afforded him for thorough education and culture, our admiration is due in a much greater degree to the man who, by himself, slone, without any extraneous assistance, and under unfavorable circumstances, has schieved an acknowledged position and exercised a beneficent influence upon his fellow-citzens. From this standpoint should be viewed the subject of the present blographical sketch, Senator Dietrich Biemann, of Walhalla, Conce County. S. C. He has achieved for himself an honorable and enviable position, and this, too, upon a path not strewn with flowers. The greater the struggle, the greater the merit. His early years were not illumined by the somstine of fortune. He was born in 1815, in Thedinghausen, in the Duchy of Erniswick. His parents, hone-t, although poor, were able to give him but a very limited education. After he left school he was aporenticed to a butcher, but young Dietrich had little taste for this pursuit. He was desirous of seeing the world, and accordingly shipped before the mast on board the "Europa." a packet ship running at that time from Bremen to the United States. The harsh and unjust treatment, however, which he received at the hands of the tyrannical and passionate captain, forced him to leave the vessel upon its arrival in Baltimore in 1843, and not finding suitable employment in that city, he came to Charleston where he met friends win on assisted and enabled him to go into business. A few years afterwards, when General J. A. Wagener founded a German society for the purpose of establishing a purely German town in the mountains of South Carolina, Mr. Biemann became one of its members, with a capital of \$3000. The society purchased, in what was then Pickens District, a tract of 20 000 acres, and in 1840 General Wagener (for many years president of the society) made the first cut into the pine tree which was, to mark the centre of the foture town. Where at that time stood nothing but verdant forests, now fiourishes the German Washalla of 1800 souls, and the present terminus of the time kinge kairond. It has steadily grown in commerce, and during the past year shipped no less than 2000 bales of cotton. The country around is one of the finest and most salubrious in America—the Italy of the New World—in respect to climate, water and soil. The little town has a brilliant future, although most of its industrial resources still lie dormant. Splendid wine and excellent fruit are produced in its orchards and vineyards. The fertile soil returns a rich crop of grain. Hops there grow wild in great luxorlance. A barley field, last summer, yielded eighty-eight bushels per acre. What a temptation for a speculative dielple of Gambrini to choose Washalla for his abode, especifally as it is still without a brewery, and must quench its thirst with imported beer.
