Beware of the Rebound.

Referring to our Columbia letters, it will be seen that the dominant faction in the lower House of the Legislature have perpetrated an outrage, which calls for the denuneistion of all benest men. The Chesterfield election case has been decided against the Reform candidates, and in favor of their Radical contestants. This was done in deflance of the majority report, the evidence in the case, and the plea of Mr. Andell, whose efforts to do a just thing by pleading his name on the record in favor of the right was contumeliously rejected.

It should not escape the ob the public that while the Bouse of Representatives of the United States, which gave, some years ago, the bad precedent of ousting Democratic members by their force of power, has recently shown a disposition to recognize and respect the will of the public, the surpasses the bad eminence of its old exemplar, and steadily refuses to imitate its change for the better. This is significant. cal junta in South Carolina fails to understand. It means that the day of arrogant assumptions of force is well-nigh spent at the Federal capital, but still continues at the capital of this State. The eyes of the Radical magnates in Congress are being opened to the fact that retribation is still a principle of the world's government; therefore are they a little wise in time. But bligder than moles are the ignorant and venul legislators at Columbia, who fancy perchance that the future has no ravenges, and that the deluge will not come In their time: We tell them, however, that every wicked invention of theirs shall return at no distant period to plague them, and when as is sure to be the case, a future Democratic or Conservative General Assembly shall take the place of the present Radical concern, the precedent of ousting distasteful members may be remembered, and

made available with a vengeance. The Legislature would have been sufficiently overwhelming in Radicalism, even if the Chesterfield Reform candidates had retained their seats in accordance with the law of the case and report of the majority. The mystery of their defeat is easily solved, when the rumor gains strength, and becomes at least a probability, that the Radical contestants now seated are the corrupt creatures of the Ring, who in defiance of the Executive and the Conservative mem-bers, favorrallway and other swindles, which promise to put money in the purses of a few manipulators, but would ultimately bankrupt the Commonwealth.

Like the strong man of old, it is easy to rend the oak and rend the State; but they who practice such feats of prowess had better beware of the rebound which has come at Washington, and will come even in South Carolina.

Attention to Details.

The Richmond Whig says it must be confessed that dislike, approaching even to disgust, for details, has always been a prominent defect in Southern character. The general has too much prevailed over the particular in all that pertained to domestic interests. Federal relations would attract more interest than agricultural, commercial and professional affairs. It is remarkable that while more was heard of State rights in the South than elsewhere, the chief aim of its political ambition was directed to a national arena, and that whilst less was heard in the North of State rights, and more of the glory and greatness of the nation, most of Its leading men devoted themselves to professional pursuits, and to commercial, manufacturing and industrial development of their own section. The consequence was that while the nation flourished under the guidance of Southern statesmen, their own States, which occupied so much more dignified a place in their theory than their practice, lost ground materially, and, as a conse-

quence, politically, whilst the North, direct-

ing its energy to its own development, grew strong and great, and by attending faithfully to its private and local interests, gradually obtained the control of those which were general.

The salvation of the South now depend upon correcting the injurious tendency of former times to look to some grand political panacea as the remedy for its woes, and practicing upon the simple truth enunciated by the Richmond Whig, that "solid national wealth is the offspring of individual ex-"ertion," and that individual exertion, to be successful, must be systematic, and devoted to particulars as well as to the general. The varied agriculture appropriate to Virginia and the Carolinas, in grain growing, fruits, &c., and the adaptation to manufactures, specially call for particular and careful detail. In the enterprises of peace as in those of war, the most successful are those who, while they are able to grasp and handle great and comprehensive schemes, do not neglect the most minute points. In the ordinary vocations of life no capacity for great things is required. but there is none in which attention to that which is particular is unimportant. What is it that makes the respectable Northern man coming to the South to engage in legitimate pursuits succeed so well, but the unwearied assiduity and patience with which he busies himself with the material interests in detail which lie around him, neglected by too many here, as well as in States further South? He finds openings and new materials of commerce in humble objec s which we had either overlooked or despised, and thus not only improves his own condition, but increases the general
