The Cowardly Murders in Union.

In common with the great mass of the law-abiding people of South Carolina, we deeply deplore the murderous outrages which have been committed in Union County by the so-called Ku-Klux-Klan. These outlaws, there is good reason to believe, are chiefly from Georgia and North Carolina, but some of them are Union County men. They have made themselves the judge and the jury. They gave to the miserable prisoners no opportunity of saying a word in their defence. It may be that the action of the marauders was precipitated by the rumor that the prisoners in jail were about to be removed to Columbia, where they might hope for a partial trial and a speedy acquittal. This, however, is no excuse for the dastardly crime of their self-constituted executioners.

There is no justification whatever for the downright murders in Union County, committed by the disgnised desperadoes who call themselves K. Klux. They are neither more nor less than murderers, and it is demanded that they be brought at once to the bar of justice, or scourged beyond the limits of the States. Their conduct is as foolish as it is intrinsically wrong! They are blaying directly into the hands of our bitter political foes. We have had already long years of tyranny and oppression, brought about by the violence or stupidity of misguided men, showenid redriss all their wrongs by the bludgeon of the bully or the rifle of the assassin. Unless we would go back to the inchoate condition with which reconstruction made the State familiar, the recurrence of the Union outrages must at once be

made impossible.

To see he regio militia life the up country, excited as the people are, is to hurry them to destruction. A detachment of United States troops could, however, prevent Ku-Kiux outrages, and would have the moral support of all good citizens. As it is, a gang of desperadoes and reckless boys strike a terrible blow at the peace and prosperity of the State.

The Puture of Germany. In striking contrast with the picture which we presented a few days ago, from the pen of an accomplished Frenchman, of "The Future of France," we find in the Fortnightly Review an essay on "The Fu-"ture of Germany," written by an observant and intelligent German, Professor Von Sybel, a brief analysis of which will have peculiar interest for our readers. The proessor begins by attributing the present war the clerical and absolutist faction in France, which saw its preponderance threatened by Liberalism, and sought in total victory, and especially in the humil-life, of a Protestant power, the restoration of its internal prestige. The triumph of France, he holds, would have been that of absolutism throughout half of Europe; but the triumph of the social democrats would - have involved the abolition of existing constifutions, and a revolution in all the present relations of property. The warding off of both evils by the success of Germany has been a gain. Will this success be dangerous to the libertles and civilization of Europe? The miserable divisions among the German States required that they should be annexed to Prussia. Every effort had been previously made by milder means to effect German unity, but in vain; and if force was used, were the obstacles easy to overcome? It is true that the Kings of Trussia were not unselfish: but their success has been a gain to the national cause. In 1862 the German Liberals vehemently opposed Bismarck on the question of military organization; but after the victories of 1866 they welcomed him enthusiastically, for they then recognized the fact that he and they had common aims. They had believed him to be violently opposed to the anti-Austrian policy, but after the Danish war they saw that he agreed with them as to the necessity of setting Austria aside. Hence they willingly accepted him for a leader, and the unification of Germany has since proceeded, as it were, by mogic. As regards the present war, the professor maintains that Alsace and Lorraine are demanded only for the protection of Germany. As regards the Russian-Baltic provinces, Germany will be satisfied with offering to every inhabitant of those districts an ever-open asylum, in which he would soon forget his Livonian birthplace. The wish to conquer the desolate shores of that inhospitable sea would never enter the head of any German statesman. No one in Germany has any longing after extensive colonial possessions. The very last Parliament answered a petition. recommending nothing more than the acquisition of a naval station in the East Indies, by passing to "the order of the day."

Apparently, this desire has prompted the

demand for the cession of Pondicherry, al-

leged to have been made in the recent ne-

gotiations with the French Provisional Gov-

ernment. The professor asserts that there

is no desire for the union of all the Germans

in the world in one vast empire; but there is

a wish for fixed limits which their nationali-

ty need not pass. There is no intention of altering for the worse the relative proportion, in the population, of three Germans to one non-Germau. There are no secret designs on Luxembourg; "but," he adds, "the "truth is, that Germany, has given offence by becoming a greet power. Germany is in a state of powerful development, and this fact-such is the nature of man-does " not attract the sympathy of our respected ' neighbors. It is never a cause of pleasure to the statesman or politician of any country when another State, which he has been "accustomed to treat as a convenient mate-"rial of his diplomatic activity, suddenly grows up into a mighty factor which must he taken into account.'

Herr Yon Sybel is not blind to the dangers attending the new Empire. It occupies a highly dangerous position in Europe, placed as it is between revengeful France, ambitious Russia, and wavering Anstria. Hence it needs a firm and secure government, and it is of vital importance that its traditional policy should not be broken frivolously. Theoretically there may be a more ideally advantageous government, but a presidential election at the end of every four years would be for Germany a struggle of life and death. Hence he argues the present military system, founded on the wide-spread education, prosperity and patriotism of the people, must be maintained. The new empire, however, will possess no responsible ministers, and the Imperial Parliament will have no power of impeaching them or of passing an annual munity bill. The Prussian Chambers are still without the right of voting the yearly supplies, and have no direct influence on the government. The means of expelling an unpopular ministry are wanting. No Prussian minister will resign office or modify his policy because he fails to carry a bill. There will be no real Parliamentary government at present, but this is because the German Diet and the Prussian Parliament have been divided into

six or eight factions, of which only two or three have ever been able to form a coalition, and even these coalitions have not always formed a majority, still less a compact or lusting majority. Parliamentary institutions have only existed for twenty years in Prussia and fifty in South Germany-too short a period to afford the population of a country a practical training for parliamentary government. On the whole, the professor does not see any brilliant future for that system, but he admits that all the States of the new Union are accustomed to constitutional forms, public discussion, and "a free press." This last admission must be taken with considerable qualification.] The chief question with them is how they can escape mediatization, or entire incorporation with Prassia. The central authority of the Empire will certainly aim at this, and nothing will prevent its succeeding but a conviction on the part of the people of the States that their transformation into an undivided and uniform Empire would be a great calamity. The professor expects that, in order to carry out their designs, both parties, will compete for the respect of the people by active endeavors to promote their prosperity and happiness, and hence much good may
