A Dawn East View of the Tariff.

One of the most significant signs of the times is an address recently issued by fortythree of the most prominent woollen manufacturing houses of New England, in which they protest against what they very justly call "our present partial, unjust and oppres-"sive system of tariff taxation." The prosperous capitalists who sign this appeal for reform of the tariff are obliged to confess that, although they have been educated in a blind faith in the protectionist heresies, the "stern logic of experience has compelled "many of the sons of New England engaged "in those industries supposed to be protect-'ed, to doubt the benefits conferred by the "system." But the reader must not suppose that by this experience is meant any of that gained by the consumers who purchase New England woollens at prices much higher than those at which English, French or German goods of like quality could be imported. These manufacturers endure the sufferings of their customers with exemplary fortitude and resignation. But what alarms them is the discovery, which they might have learned, however, from any respectathe butcher, who was sadly in need of meat a Smith down, that protection enhances the cost to them of what they have to buy in order to manufacture their goods. They are compelled to pay duties, in some instances amounting to one hundred and ten per cent, upon the raw materials they import, while they are protected in their own finished products by a duty disproportionately low. They are especially disgusted at of this city (except National Banks out of this the tariff monopoly of coal for the protection of the Pennsylvania strikers, and which they dolefully and truthfully assert to bear heavily upon all our manufacturers as well as upon our whole population, demanding from them an annual tribute of millions of dollars-a thing "totally without excuse or "palliation." They accordingly call upon the manufacturers and people of New England to exert their well-known formidable talents for agitation in favor, not of diminishing their own tariff protection, but of

giving them their raw materials free. In

return they offer to "afford to manufacture

"their goods under a low revenue duty." As

these manufacturers include among the arti-

cles they wish to import free, wool, coal,

iron, steel and salt, the duties on which

are, as they complain, "oppressions which

good mothers of London will feel easier now that "abstract millions of dollars annually from

"the profits of their productive labor," they promise, in the shape of partial tariff reform, an entering wedge, sufficient, if properly driven in, to split in twain the tariff Upas tree which is poisoning the business atmosphere of the whole country. We therefore welcome their effort.

The Southern Pacific Railroad.

This great project, so important to the uture of the South, seems likely, at last, to become an accomplished fact. The national House of Representatives which has hitherto, during this session, rejected every bill involving a grant of the public land, on Tuesday last passed the Southern Pacific Railroad bill, in an amended form, by a very decisive vote. The amendment strikes from the bill all the proposed branches of the road, and leaves it to provide for a straight overland line from El Paso, in Texas, to San Diego, in California. The easy passage of the bill, as indicated in the debate, was due to the conviction on the part of representatives that the South, in sheer justice, ought to have an overland road, Congress having already authorized the building of the Northern and Central overland roads. It was for this reason alone that some of the Democratic and Republican opponents of further land grants voted for this bill. The land grant is ten alternate sections for every mile on each side of the road in California (there being no land grant in To .s, except from that State,) and twenty alternate sections to the mile on each side of the road in the territories of New Mexico and Arizona, making a grant of about twenty millions of acres of public land. This is the same as was given to the Union and Central Pacific roads. There is little doubt of the ultimate concur rence of the Senate in the measure; and it is announced that as soon as the bill shall have become a law, work upon the road will be vigorously begun.
