-The Empress Augusta, of Germany, has sent an autograph letter to the ladies who raised junds for the German victims of the war, which is being photographed.

-Ex-Queen Isabella has at length surrendered all hopes of restoration to the throne of Spain, has purchased a fine residence in Vienna, and intends to make that city her permanent residence. -A New York working girl writes to the

Sun, offering to sell her hair to some one who cap better afford to wear a good head of hair than she, for \$100. It is a yard and a quarter long, thick, and of a light brown color. -New York iscanzious to know where its

-A Richmond lady recently interviewed Governor Walker on a railroad question. He asked her which side she was on, when she re-plied that she was on the fence. The Governor gallantly responded: "Then, Madame, I wish no more agreeable position than to be sitting by

-Judge Barnard, of New York, has decided that if a man and woman publicly live tegether as husband and wife, and acknowledge the marital relations, it is not necessary that aformal marriage ceremony should have been rmed to entitle the reputed wife to all her legal rights.

-Victoria, wife of the Crown Prince of Prussia, is declared to be as economical as her mother, the Queen of England, and to be greatly assisted in her financial conservation by her husband. 'The princely pair are reported to save nearly a million thalers a year out of their income.

-The chaptain on opening a session of the Legislature, at Albany, recently, very appropriately-prayed that "the men who are in the habit of loitering about the halls of the legislature with bribery in their hands might be induced to see the error of their ways, and that their wicked designs, if they had any, might be thwarted."

-The Germans expelled from France during the recent war, it is estimated, amounted n number to 120,000. The average indemnity for direct losses suffered by this expulsion is placed at \$600 a head, so that the entire dam ages arising from this harsh war measure amounts to seventy-two millions of dollars.

-The New York Star states that, at a Hebrew wedding in that city, some days ago, the bride wore conspicuously the diamond set once worn by the wife of the late President Lincoln, and which was purchased by the hosband of the present owner on the occasion of the sale of Mrs. Lincoln's wardrobe, on Broadway, several years since.

-The Rothschilds are said to have lost from 50,000,000 to 75,000,000 by the result of the Franco-German war. They all believed at first that the French would be victorious, but two weeks after the Germans had crossed the Rhine they saw their mistake, and made new investments which prevented them from losing thrice as much as they would have done had they not corrected their blunder in

good season. -The specie in France to answer the demands under the treaty of peace with Germany, is the subject of investigation among statisticians. As one element of the calculaton, it is said that since 1795, when the decimal system was introduced, there have been coine \$966,347,291 in stiver, and \$1,427,155,201 in gold, making a total of \$2,393,502,482. On the other hand, it is stated, that twelve millions of francs, or two thousand four hundred milliards of dollars, must be taken into account for money called in and recoined money sent abroad from France. The quantity of gold coined in the world since 1848 is placed at one

thousand four hundred millions of dollars. -The English newspapers report proceedings in equity brought against Gambetta, a member of the French government, to enforce payment under a contract for the supply of twenty batteries of guns, which contract, now the war is over, Gambetta seeks to repudiate. As security Gambetta deposited \$1,260,000 with a banking firm, and an injunction was asked for to restrain the bankers from parting with this sum until the claim was settled. It was alleged that \$600,000 of this amount had been sent over to New York, where the contract was to be carried out, and from whence the guns were to be shipped. This statement was denied, and un injunction for the juli sum was

granted. -In the Roman Catholic churches of London, on February 19th, a pastoral letter from Archbishop Manning was read. This document says that the chief sin of England is "pride of life." No nation, it was asserted, their ballots with more judgment and de-

people by insular security, tradition of success and exceptional prosperity were deluded into the belief that these things would last forever. The great increase of luxury in domestic se ciety was referred to, and elaborate self-indulgence, it was asserted, had invaded the higher ranks of men, and excess in wine, by which the mind and body became inflamed and diseased, had become habitual. The extravagant fashions that prevailed in female dress were rebuked, and it was stated that while men had improved in this respect, the attire of women had become more costly, ostentatious and singular, even to strangeness.

-A New York letter of Friday says : "The much mooted question of quick transit up and down town is at length about to be solved by the adoption of a compromise bill, providing for a viaduct road, commencing at Chambers street, and running through Grosby street clear up to Harlem River, with branches on each aide of the city. The road is to cost \$3,000,000 per mile. Among the corporator are many of the editorial fraternity, including Horace Greeley, of the Tribune, Manton Mar ble, of the World, Charles A. Dana, of the Sun, and J. G. Bennett, Jr., of the Herald. It is estimated that two miles and a half of continuous buildings will have to be swept away to obtain the necessary room, and that the total cost will be about \$60,000,000. William M. Tweed, Peter B. Sweeny, and other Tammany magnates, it is understood, are the chief engineers of the scheme; but the compromise, as agreed to, also takes in the various Republican interests, so that the politicians of both parties for once are in perfect accord. Where the money is to come from we are as yet not informed."

"Watchman, What of the Night !"

The rights of man have been so persist ently preached that they ought to be understood very well in our country. The eloment declaration of Rousseau has carried conviction to the mind and heart of the majority of our people. At last, by the sophisms of the pen and the power of the sword, we find humanity elevated as far as the circumstances will admit, to the supposed state of nature. We meet Rousseau's ideal man every day-in streets, council chambers and legislative halls-the man who does as he pleases and takes what he wants.

But what the passionate Frenchman did net see, his disciples are beginning to learn -that the rights of man are subordinate to the rights of society. Liberty without order is chaos and license. Rights without diffies are destructive of society; and without society man himself cannot exist. Next to the wild orgie of the French Revolution we owe to the Radical party the most striking illustration of this principle.

Congress is busy in discussing Southern disorders. And they are well worthy of atention. Why are communities of peaceloving and order-leving citizens so disturbed? Why are the people of Yorkville and Chester and other once quiet villages compelled to patrol their streets at night, and guard their homes against the stealthy or sudden marauder? It is because public right has been violated in the interest of plundering cliques and thieving partisans. It is because legislation has become a farce. It is, in particular, because property instead of being protected is rather assailed by law. Happy would we be if Congress, which has imposed these conditions upon Southern society, would hasten to remove them, and that, not by enactments against this or that class of men, or this or that section of the

republic, but by even-handed legislation. And would it not be worth the attention of that most sugacious body to consider whether the disease which has outcropped here and there at the South is not an epidemic, whose ravages extend to other parts of the republic? While they undertal cure, we trust that they will take the North in hand as well. The coal riots will do to begin with, or the Pennsylvania railroads, or the Indiana Legislature. Let Congress proclaim to its partisans in every State that license is not law, and that might is not right. Else it will be able to prophesy like the French Regent: "After me, the deluge." There are follies and outrages, originating in high places and encouraged by the powers that be, against which there is no resort but the inalienable right of self-protection. As our readers-well know, we have not been the promoters of violence in any case but have earnestly discountenanced it, We have studied the things that make for peace; and therefore we may the more frankly avow our conviction that to those peaceful combinations and policies which would mitigate our evils, the prevailing Radicalism in the Congress of the United States has been the chief obstacle. The change gradually going on in the character of that body is the most auspicious omen for the future of the South-

ern States. The Vaccination Pother.

The curious opposition to vaccination, which has been gaining strength lately among a certain class of popular agitators. has infected even so unimaginative a body as the English Parliament. A motion has been made in the House of -Commons to appoint committee to inquire into the working of the vaccination act. The soul of the British freeman revolts against compulsory vaccination, and being of an argumentative disposition, he attempts to prove that the great discovery of Jenner is itself the cause of more evils than it cures. The agitators will probably find statistics as much against them as is medical science. In Ireland, where the act has been strictly enforced, the result has been altogether satisfactory, and the registrar of Dublin recently reported no deaths from small-pox during the past year. The investigations of the committee will probably be of service in quieting the agitation on this subject which seems to be prevalent in England, and, from this point of view, are perhaps not to be regretted.

The Pioneer of Radicalism.

Mr. Wendell Phillips, the most original thinker as well as the boldest speaker in the Radical ranks, took occasion in his recent lecture in New York on the "Questions of the Day," to arraign the Republican party in his usual lively and incisive style. He said that it "was rotten to the core with its servility "to wealth at Washington." He also denounced capital, and predicted that twenty years hence the workingmen would control Europe; and he declared that in this country we were approaching a time when capital would bave no power to control labor. The workingmen should have opportunities of acquiring education, so that they could cast

essed such self-congratulation and the stroy monopolies which now control the action of thousands of the laborers of the country. Mr. Phillips also entered upon the question of female suffrage, and thought, that the privilege of the ballot would be a good thing for women, as enabling them to secure legislation upon subjects in which they, as women, are interested. The indomitable anti-slavery agitator quarrefled a little on the subject of the anti-abolitionist mobs of the past, and said that the Chinese issue must shortly be met, and that San Francisco would have to learn facts which at present she did not wish to know in regard to that unpopular topic. Altogether, this senior wrangler of Radicalism was in his best vein, and in his brief hour on the platform set up and knocked down more phantoms of social and political economy than a dozen ordinary men could have done together in a year's time.

A Just Measure.

A very good law has just been passed by the New York Legislature for the protection of those who invest in life insurance. It provides that, when three annual payments have been made on any policy, the company shall not, whenever an action is brought, interpose as a defence that the policy was obtained by fraud. The object of the bill is to make the companies more careful when taking risks, and more scrupulous in paying them when they fall due. The insurance folks consider the measure a great hardship; but the public everywhere will approve it.
