NEWS OF THE DAY.

Gold, at noon, in New York, yesterday, opened steady at 113.

The New York cotton market closed active and higher; sales 5633 bales at 15c.

At Liverpool cotton closed with a hardening tendency; uplands 7 1/4, Orleans 7 1/4; sales 18,000 bales.

There are said now to be about seventy partners in the Rothschild's banking firms.

The Richmond courts admitted their first colored lawyer to practice last week.

The Princess Metternich has offered to Louis Napoleon the use of her palace at Vienna.

The death of Rochford and the insanity of Trochu, lately reported by cable, are now both contradicted.

Among the French prisoners in Germany is a grandson of Jerome Bonaparte, Prince Charles Bonaparte. He is quartered at Loetzen, Prussia, and is under rigorous surveillance.

There lately passed through Nancy nine Japanese officers of high rank, homebound, after witnessing the investment and capitulation of Paris. They had with them an interpreter, formerly an officer in the British army.

The many attempts at escape made by the French prisoners just before the armistice, have been found to be the result of a complicated conspiracy among them to aid Bourbaki in his attempted invasion of Germany.

In Berlin they have "Homes for the Homeless," an extensive collection of buildings. These are now undergoing improvements which will make them ornaments to the part of the town in which they are situated.

These buildings are divided into separate departments for homeless women and children and for homeless men.

Count Bismarck having received ink, inkstand and pen, to be used in signing the treaty of peace, was obliged to refuse a table to sign it on, as too inconvenient at present.

A Hamburg dame followed with a splendid and elaborate pen-wiper, for which she received, as the other donors received before her, a letter of thanks. Blotting-paper and sand were not thus provided.

An Alsatian peasant was recently questioning a Bavarian soldier somewhat closely as to the strength of his regiment, when the latter, suspecting that his interrogator was either a spy or a Franco-tireur in disguise, suddenly "drew off" and sent him sprawling on the ground, and after waiting for the Alsatian to pick himself up, coolly remarked in his Bavarian dialect, "That's just how strong I am by myself; so if you'll just put things together, you'll find out perhaps how strong the whole of us are."

The French Government has begun to lay on new taxes at the wrong end. A tax on cotton that is expected to produce from twelve to sixteen millions of dollars per annum is a very questionable gain to the French treasury. For its first effect will be to place Rouen out of competition with Manchester in the markets of the world; its next will involve a protective tax much heavier than at present on imported cotton manufactures, and this will almost, if not altogether, destroy the rising prosperity of the calico planters, and so leave France with one productive industry the less. The other "imported raw materials" that are marked out for taxation will probably turn out to furnish quite as delusive sources of increased revenue.

Washington specials say that Senator Sumner is in receipt of sympathetic dispatches from all quarters, and that many senators who voted against him excuse themselves by pleading "the party whip." Trumbull, Schurz and Wilson say that a breach in the party will result, which will be fatal to Grant's re-nomination. The President warmly approves the course of the Senate. Sumner himself is implacable, and it is said that his forthcoming speech on San Domingo, nearly completed, will charge that the crimes for which Andrew Johnson was impeached were white as snow compared with those against Grant. The government is said to be indignant at the reflections to obey the request of the House of Representatives for a court of inquiry on the first class, at West Point. The "state dinner" to the high commission is pronounced the most elegant ever given in the White House. Everybody was in full dress, and the gentlemen wore their orders and decorations. There were nine different kinds of wine besides liquor.

No better illustration can be given of the complete demoralization of the French army of the Seine than there is contained in the recital of the following incident which occurred just before the armistice: Two Prussian dragoons, venturing too far beyond their own lines, found themselves suddenly surrounded by a haggard crowd of Gards Mobile. One of the two Prussians could speak French, and one of the Gards was an Alsatian, and understood German. Therefore, both parties were in a favorable condition to argue the question fairly. The two Prussians refused to give themselves up as prisoners of war, saying, "If we go with you, we will be a great deal worse off than we are now; but, if you come with us, you will be a great deal better off than you are now. It won't do you any good to take us prisoners. It won't put any meal into your mouths, nor warm you, nor yet clothe you. But if you let us take you prisoners, you will be cared for and treated exactly as our men are, and all your hardships and dangers, and fighting for nothing, will be over." Despite French patriotism, French stomachs triumphed, and the Mobles followed in the wake of the two dragoons into the Prussian camp. Long and loud, but good-humored, was the laughter that greeted the appearance of the two captors and their crowd of captives. When the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg heard of it he exclaimed, "That was diplomacy," and straightway sent the two amateur diplomatists a handsome present.

The New York World, in an editorial which we publish in another column, invites an expression of Southern sentiment in regard to the political issues involved in the next Presidential election. The prevailing feeling among the white people of South Carolina, we think we may say, is not by any means of a character to justify what seem to be the apprehensions of the World.

We resisted what were called the reconstruction measures, as a policy unreasonable and hostile-deficient in statesmanship as well as in magnanimity. The schemes by which the two races at the South were divided, and the colored people were turned over in a body to the control of worthless adventurers, we opposed, for the freedmen's sake as well as our own. Mr. Beecher's per argument that the franchise was like a gun, the use of which must be learned by practice, served the purpose of the great sensationalist very well; but we fancy that he would have liked it less had an experiment of the sort been first tried upon his own premises. Any one can judge now, by its results, how puerile was this method of handling a great national difficulty.
