vance. A worthy industry. -With the process of augmenting wealth mong the Americans the demand for those things which riches alone can secure is increasing. In this way a great trade in diamonds is springing up in this country. There are three or four extensive houses in New York especially devoted to the business of importing diamonds. Their "stock" is not very bulky, but it is very valuable. It might be carried in the fob-pocket of one of the mem bers of the firms, but its cash value would serve to buy up a whole block of buildings. It is a noticeable fact in connection with the American demand for diamonus, that only the best stones are sold to any great extent in this country, and among large dealers abroad the highest grades are invariably known as "American diamonds." One of the most valuable stones of recent importation was that which was presented in the snape of a breast pin to William M. Tweed, or New York, not

long ago, by a number of his friends. Its cost

was \$15,500, and its weight nine or ten carats.

Of the diamonds in the rough now obtained, Brazil furnishes the bulk. But they are gene rally small stones. Not more than one eighteen carats is found in ten thousand picked up. The anticipations raised by the discovery of the diamond fields in South Africa have not been realized. It is not thought that enough will be found there to affect the prices of diamonds to any great extent.

-Henderson Oxendine, the negro desperado and outlaw, who for six years past has led a gang which have been the terror of several counties in North Carolina, was hung at Lumperton, N. C., on Friday last. He made a full confession of his crimes.

-The New York Herald, of Saturday, in its reports of the stock market for the previous day, says: "The Southern list was quiet and generally strong. The only feature was a sudden rise of about two per cent. In the new South Carolinas in the afternoon upon the announcement that the State agent in this city will pay the April interest in gold coin on and after the 1st proximo. The old and new issues are gradually approaching in value, owing to the prospect that bonds of all kinds will be funded into the new sterling loan, which will make the State debt more uniform than it

-A census of the people of Great Britain is to be taken at midnight on the 2d of April, confined solely to the enumeration of inhabitants. Four days before the enumeration blank schedules are delivered at every house, and on these are to be recorded the names and ages of every resident of the dwelling, at midnight, on Sunday, April 2. No child born after midnight is to be included, nor is any person dying before that hour on that night. These schedules include the age, birthplace and occupation. The districts are made sufficlently small to enable the agents to collect all the schedules on Monday, they taking the pains to see that each has been filled out according to the directions. Each family makes its own record, and delivers the paper to the collector. In this way the enumeration in the whole island is simultaneous, and is completed in a single day, giving the exact population at a particular hour. The general estimate in England is that England, Scotland and Wales will show an aggregate population of 31,000,

The Reign of Terror in Paris.

The foreign telegrams, printed this morning, show that the unfortunate capital of France is now in a worse plight than when the German lines girded it round and hostile shells were falling in every quarter of the city. Then the people were united. In the presence of the common danger they stood firmly together, and were ready to brave every peril to save their unhappy country. Now, the Germans are marching homeward and the "Reds" rise in revolt, and do all that they may to re-establish the horrors of the great Revolution . The moment that the victorious Germans withdraw, the rabble of Paris do their best to cut the throats of these whom the war had spared. This is as char acteristic as it is horrible and disgusting. During the closing days of the war France

learned that there was a people outside of Paris-that the fair city on the Seine was not all France. This lesson will not be forgotten in the moment of civil strife. Bordeaux and Lyons and Marseilles may bluster and fight if they will, but the provinces will be ready, if need be, to march against Paris, and will stand ready to sustain any government which promises security and peace.

We believe that at this time the French people care little what form of government is given them. Their bomes are desolate, their fertile lands are laid waste, the national flag traffs in the dust. They consented to peace because a longer struggle was useless, because they sighed for quiet and repose. And now that France has no hope, save in steady work and administrative reform, the howling Reds rise in rebellion, shoot down their law-abiding brethren, and cast abroad-the bloody banner of rapine and

For M. Thiers and his colleagues there can be no backward step. They must crush out the revolt, or the Germans will do it for them. There is, in truth, every reason to believe that all Frenchmen who have anything to lose had rather be ruled by a German general than by the insurgents who threaten with death the very generals who have deserved best of their country. It is hard to tell what the end will be, but it is certain that by French bayonets or German needle-guns the insurrection will be crushed out and the semblance of order restored.

The New Cotton State.

The marvellous energy and rapidity with which California is multiplying her industrial resources, far more than compensates for the decline of her gold mining interest. Her farmers are already engaged in the culture of coffee, cocoa, opium and tea with the most flattering prospects of success. The vineyards of the State have proved so remunerative that each year they are made to cover an increased area. The planting of the mulberry, and the growth of silk, sheep and cattle raising, and wheat, have each been found profitable; and now we are hardly surprised to hear that the Golden State bids fair to claim a place among that sisterhood of Commonwealths whose staple production is cotton. One firm are planting-three hundred acres in the Merced bottom, and an individual has five hundred ready for planting in Los Angelos. Other like undertakings are reported elsewhere through the State. We shall watch with great interest the result of these experiments in a State which less than a quarter of a century ago was a wilderness, and which has already achieved no mean prominence in the departments of mining, agriculture, grazing, manufactures and com-

The Russian War Cloud.

The result of the recent Conference of the Powers on the Eastern-huestien dispels, for the moment, the fear of another great war, growing out of the abrogation of the restrictions placed upon Russia by the treaty of 1856. The obnoxious provisions of that treaty, which are formally wiped out by the new treaty just signed, are 'the following: "Article XI. The Black Sea is neutralized.

While open to the mercantile marines of all nations, its waters and ports are formally and in perpetuity isserdicted to vessels of war, gio nations having territory

key engage neither to construct nor maintain any naval or military areenal opon its coast."-· In securing the abolition of the restriction imposed by these clauses, Russia is enabled, without incurring the hazard of interference on the part of her neighbors, to take the first step towards that gobbling of the domain of the Moslem, which, since the time of Peter the Great, has been the dream of every Czar. The shores of the Black Sea will now be speedily fortified, and its waters will bristle with Russian fleets. When this is accomplished, we are likely to learn the real significance of the recent rumors of a secret alliance between Russia and the new German
