CAUGHT IN THE ACT.—Jacob Daniels, a colored boy, entered the house of Adeline Fairfield, in Cow alley, (Philadelphia street) at eight o'clock on Sunday night, through an open window, and the boy being caught, proceeded to break open the proprietress's chest with a hatchet which he had brought with him for the purpose.

HE WAS PLACED IN THE HANDS OF THE POLICE, and being brought before the Mayor on Monday morning, was turned over to the State for prosecution.

HOPE-STEALING.—Last Thursday night the office of Mr. John H. Seligman, at the foot of Broad street, was entered and a large coil of rope was discovered soon after in the possession of a Mr. Brown, who had purchased it from a colored youth, whose name by name, Moses was arrested and brought before Trial Justice Levy, yesterday afternoon, for examination, during which he acknowledged the theft.

HE SAID THAT, after entering the house, he found the rope too heavy, so he cut it in two, and getting another boy to help him, the two carried it to Mr. Brown, to whom he sold it for the sum of \$2. The prisoner was sent to jail for thirty days.

Brigade Attack upon Two White Men—Mills House and Charleston Club—Escape.

A brigade attack, wholly without provocation, was made upon Driver Davis and Conductor Toomer, of King Street Car, No. 1, at about 9 o'clock, last night.

It appears that No. 1 was going up King street, when it overtook the company of negro militiamen, who were marching on the track.

The conductor turned to his assistance and helped him into the car. Now the militiamen turned upon the conductor and struck him heavily upon the head.

This incident shows what the whites have to expect, when the armed militiamen, at fifty to one, attack unarmed citizens.
