NEWS OF THE DAY.

-Gold closed in New York, yesterday, at 104a104. -Cotton closed quiet, but weak at 151c.;

sales 3430 bales -In Liverpool cotton closed dull and unchanged; uplands 7]a7]d, Orleans 7[a7]d; sales 10,000 bales.

-A Radical Ku-Klax organization has been formed in Florida.

-The splendid Episcopal Church of the Messlah, Brooklyn, was destroyed by fire last evening. Loss about \$100,000, probably covered by insurance.

-On Sunday afternoon a fire of considerable magnitude was raging in the woods in South Carolina, beyond Hamburg. Of its extent or damage to property we are unadvised, but from the high wind prevailing, it is probable that considerable destruction of fencing, etc., will result.

-The New York Evening Post is angry with Congress for occupying itself almost entirely with Ku-Klux bills, and thinks it is time wasted, as they are all unconstitutional. General amnesty it still holds to be the best remedy for disorders at the South, so far as Congress is concerned.

-Distinctions on account of color are being rapidly obliterated in Congress. The House of Representatives contains five colored members, and on Saturday that body deposed a white boy acting as a page or messenger, and appointed a negro youth in his place. This is the first instance in which a colored boy has been appointed a page in Congress.

A telegraphic dispatch announces the death of ex-Senator Jacob M. Howard, at his residence in Detroit, Michigan, on Sunday morning, of apoplexy, with which he was first seized on Friday evening last. Senator Howard closed his last term in the Senate at the expiration of the Forty-first Congress, on the 3d of March last. He was a zealous Republican, able in argument, and especially ardent in the support of the war measures against the South during the administration of Lincoln. Professionally, Senator Howard was a lawyer of considerable reputation.

-The joint high commission, in full force, attended an amateur fox hunt on Saturday at the country residence of S. T. Suit, in Prince George County, Maryland, some six miles distant. The rainy day interfered somewhat with the sport, but it passed off something after the English fashion. The hounds and foxes numbered about fifty, and were brought from Virginia a few weeks since. Sir Stafford Northcete won the first race and the first fox. None of the American commissioners indulged in the sport beyond being mere spectators. A dinner of fourteen courses was subsequently served to the distinguished guests.

...The feature of the debate in the House on Saturday was the speech of Elliott, the negro member from South Carolina. Elliott had a carefully prepared speech in support of the Kn-Klux bill, which he read, and which was listened to with much interest. It made high pretensions to learning, and exhibited a good deal of familiarity with the writings of Story and other commentators on the constitution. Elliott delivered his speech in a sort of pulpit style, and was not near so effective as when he spoke some weeks ago extempore. The Democrats freely assert that his s written for him by Ben Butler.

-The Golden Age, for this week, contains the following remarkable statement: Swinburne vibrates between the inspirations of wine and the exasperations of madness, and between fear and disgust at his conduct, people are forced to exclude him to a their houses. head furiously against the wall. -The sentiment between the so-called Liberal and Clerical parties in Rome made itself violently manifest on the 10th instant, at the Church of the Jesuits, after an exciting sermon by Father Thomasi. The disturbances were continued on the following day, when a fight took place between the parties on the plaza. The soldiers of King Victor Emanuel interfered, charged upon the rioters, drove them into the church, and arrested some nineteen or twenty, including Father Callati, a priest at the altar, whom they charged with "insulting a polloeman." The prisoners of both parties were taken to the lock-up amid a hooting mob, in which the anti-clerical element seemed to preponderate. The cabinas furnished no intelligence of the sequel, but the event illustrates the state of feeling in the Boman capt-

tal under the new regime. -General Butler is about to issue, in pamphlet form, the speech of Speaker Blaine and his reply, delivered in the House on the 16th of March," concerning the appointment of a special committee to investigate the condition of the South during the recess. He will also publish his celebrated letter, which brought on this memorable set-to. General Butler, in an explanatory note, asserts that a combination was made among certain Republicans in the House, of whom Speaker Blaine was the leader, to prevent the passage of any bill for the suppression of Southern outrages. He intends, it is stated, to circulate half a million copies of this pamphlet in order to head off Bialne's presidential aspirations. The speaker, on the other hand, it is -alleged, will leave General Butler out when he appoints the House committees, or at least place him in subordinate positions, as a panishment for his fight with

-The Augusta Constitutionalist contains an account of a lynching in Washington County, Ga., on Tuesday night last, which says : From a private letter from Sandersville, Washingtan County, under date of Wednesday, we are advised of a shocking occurrence which took place there on Tuesday night. Last week the barn and stables of Mr. E. S. Langmeade were mule and a quantity of corn and fodder. The fire was believed to have been incendiary, and suspicion of firing the property fastened upon a negro man named Elbert Harris, who was arrested and committed to latt to answer the charge. On fuesday night about two hundred disgrised men went to the lati, secured enhim to Laugmeade's pond and snot him to like. No wonder that cases are reported

on Wednesday morning, it having been thrown into the pond by his executioners.

—On Sunday, March 15, there arrived in the Mersey one of the largest importations of silver that has ever taken place at Liverpool. The Gulon Company's steamer Wisconsin, Captain Williams, which arrived that day from New York, had on board the enormous quantity of 65 tons and 5 cwt. of silver coin, principally Spanish and Mexican dollars, a large mount of which is intended for this country and the remainder for different part of the centinent. As soon as the Wisconsin was secured at her moorings in dock, the work of getting the specie boxes ashore was comnenced, and in a short time safely completed. Wagons were in readiness, and the specie was conveyed to the London and Northwestern rallway station, where it was placed in 14 closed railway vans, and dispatched to London by an early train on Monday morning.

Are the Taxes Heavy Beyond Endurance !

THE Columbia Union, the administration organ, buckles on its armor, and endeavors to prove that, after all, the people of South Carolina are very lightly taxed. It denies that there is any such thing in this State as exorbitant taxation, and declares that the trouble is, "not in the amount of taxation, but "is in taxation itself." We have the right to assume that the Union reflects the opinions of the State officials, and that it is their champion and apologist. At all events, it presents the strongest argument it can find to sustain its off-hand conclusion that "ne one who has really examined the matter carefully can, for one moment, conscien-"tiously assert" that the taxes levied by the State government "are heavy beyond en-"durance." The main argument of the Union is contained in the following paragraph :

"The state tax is nine mills on the dollar, or nine dollars on the thousand; or, in other words and plainer terms, a man who is worth one thousand dollars in real estate or other property, would pay to the State just nine dollars, and no more. If the county added four mills, which is about the extent of any county tax, that would aid four dollars more, or a total of thirteen dollars on a thousand. A person worth two thousand dollars would pay twenty-six dollars State-and county tax; one worth three thousand deliars would pay thirtynine dollars, and one worth ten thousand dollars would pay one hundred and thirty dollars. Now, we submit to the judgment of a candid public it this is exorbitant taxation? If a peron worth ten thousand dollars cannot afford to pay one hundred and thirty dollars tax, he is indeed a poor stick. The trouble is not in the amount of taxation, but is in taxation itself."

Even a hasty glance at these statements shows their disingenuousness. They do not tell the whole truth. The State tax is nine mills on the dollar, and the county tax does not exceed four mills additional. But this is the tax for 1870, due last month; and in November next a second tax (for 1871) falls dne. For instance-the tax of 1870, to which alone the Union refers, is \$2,415,047. Under the old law, the tax for 1871 would have been payable in March, 1872; but the General Assembly, at its last session, anticipated the time of payment, so that the tax for 1871 should be due and collectable in November, 1871. The people have, therefore, to pay, this year, about 13 mills on the dollar for 1879, and about 10 mills on the dollar for 1874. The whole tax for the year is \$4,395,000-which is ten times the average anifual cost of the State government for ten years preceding the war. The man who is "worth one thousand dollars" must pay. this year, a tax of twenty-three dollars, instead of thirteen dollars, as stated by the Union. In the very beginning of its arguent, the administration organ suppresses half the truth. But the fallacy of the statement of the

taxes of the year at \$13 on \$1000, or \$130 on \$10,000, (we have shown that they are nearly twice as much,) and flippantly says that, if a person worth ten thousand dollars cannot afford to pay one hundred and thirty dollars tax, he is, indeed, a poor stick. We say so too. But the Union confuses assessed value and real value. There is not a man in South Carolina who is assessed for taxation at \$10,000 who is worth ten thousand dollars, or whose property, if sold, would produce anything like that sum. The Union assumes that the assessment for taxation establishes the worth of the thing-what it will bring. In this way the Union may, at once, by increasing the assessment double or treble (in its own mind) the value of all the property in South Carolina. To the outside world, it is a conclusive explanation to say that the Carolina ex-slaveholders are growling because they now have to pay a tax of \$13 on the \$1000, while before the war they had to pay only a few cents. The truth is, and the Union ought to know it, that all the taxable property in South Carolina is assessed for taxation at far higher than its market value. In Charleston the assessment may be nearer the reality than it is anywhere else, but even here \$4,000 was added to the taxable value of a house, because the owner spent upon it, in painting and repairs, just one thousand dollars. And we can say, without fear of contradiction, that in the country districts property is assessed at double, treble and quadruple its value. We have in our mind now a tract of land in Orangeburg assessed at \$10,000, which could not be sold for \$3000. The Union would say that the owner of this tand is worth \$10,000 and must be "a poor stick" if he can't pay \$130 in taxes. The truth is that the tax of \$130 is upon property worth only \$3000. It is a tax of more than four per cent. upon what the planter is really worth. In November there will be as much more to pay. According to the Union, a man worth \$10,000 pays \$130. According to the truth, a man worth \$3000 pays two hundred and thirty dollars. This

We go further and say that, the taxation ofth year must be measured by the income out of which the taxes are paid. Upon this occasion we cannot go into particulars. It is sufficient for the moment to say that the gross income of the State of South Carolina this year will not exceed \$20,000,000.
