AN ALLEGED SECRET ORGANIZA-TION-ITS AIMS AND ITS SYSTEM.

Constitution.

I.-NAME. Council of Safety.

II.—OBJECTS. The objects of this organization are, first: To preserve the peace, enforce the laws and protect and defend the persons and property of the good people of this State; and second, to labor for the restoration of constitutional liberty as taught by our forefathers, and to reform abuses in the government, State and national

III.-HOW EFFECTED. Its operations shall be two-fold: 1. Political, social and moral, under the forms of established laws.

2. Physical, according to the recognized principles of the law of self-defence.

IV.-OF COUNCILS. IV.—OF COUNCILS.

1. There shall be in every county, (the City of Charleston for this purpose being considered a county,) one council in each beat district, composed of approved white men above the age of 18 years. They shall be known by the letters of the alphabet.

PASSAGE OF THE KU-KLUX BILL

A Succinct Statement of its Provisions

WASHINGTON, April 6. The House passed the modified Ku-Klux bill to-day by a vote of 118 to 91. The following is a succinct statement of the bill as passed, with omissions and additions :

The substitute strikes out the second, third and fourth sections of the original bill. The second section of the original made it a felony for two or more persons to conspire together to do any act in violation of the rights, privileges and immunities secured by the Constitution of the United States, and punishable in the United States Cor t.

The third section provides that in all cases of insurrection, domestic violence, uniawful combinations or conspiracies, which so far obstruct the execution of State laws as to deprive any portion or class of people of the rights, privileges and immunities secured by the constitution and laws, and if any State, through its proper authorities fails, or neglects, to apply for national aid, the President may use the national forces to suppress such insurrection, domestic violence, unlawful combinations and conspiracies, and to arrest offenders and deliver them to the marshal of the

district. The fourth section provides that whenever such combinations become so powerful as to overthrow, or set at deflance, the State authorities, and when the punishment of offenders, and the preservation of public satety, shall become impracticable, it shall be deemed a rebellion, and the President may, after proclanation, suspend the privileges of the writ of habeas corpus, which provision shall continue until June 1, 1872.

The substitute for the second section makes it felony for two or more persons conspiring together to overthrow the government, or to levy war against it, or to oppose, by force, the authority of the United States, or by force to take or selze the forts or property; or, by force or intimidation, or threat, prevent any person from accepting or holding any federal office, or to revent him from discharging the duties of the office to leave the State or district where his duties may be lawfully performed, or injure him in his person or property, on account of the lawful discharge his duties, or threaten or injure a witness or juror in the United States Court, or conspire together to deprive any class of persons of the equal protection of the laws, or of equal privileges and immunities under the laws, or prevent, or hinder, the authorities of the State from securing all persons in the equal protection of the laws, and confers upon the party injured the right of action for damages. AN ACT to authorize Henry C. Lancaster, Smith Howe and Henry A. Towles to collect wharfage and storage.

Be it enacted by the Sepate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same:

That Henry C. Lancaster, Smith Howe and Henry A. Towles, their heirs, executors, successors and assigns, be, and they are hereby, authorized to collect the usual rates of wharfage and storage upon all goods, merchandise and commodities that may be landed at or upon their wharf, at Enterprise Landing, on Wadmalaw Island. Approved March 7th, A. D. 1871.

An Acr to amend an act entitled "An act to provide for the conversion of State securities."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same:

That any corporation formed in com pliance with the terms of this act is hereby empowered and authorized to issue bonds, secured by a lien on the property of the said corporation, to an amount not exceeding the value of the property owned by said corporation, with interest on said bonds, payable semiannually; and it is further provided, that any corporation formed in compliance with the terms of this act is hereby authorized and empowered to issue additional bonds to such an amount that the interest thereon, at eight per cent, per aunum, shall not exceed the net ncome of said corporation.
