It is not wonderful, therefore, that the meeting, after declaring that the taxes are corruptly raised and improvidently spent, and that the credit of the State has been pledged illegally, and that it is now proposed to pledge it for still further loans by a new Issue of bonds, announced that the taxpayers and property-holders of Charleston will not hold these bonds binding, and will resist all taxation for the payment of them by 'every legiti-'mate means in their power.' How we are Robbed.

The Unionville Times explains that under the old system of drawing juries there was no expense whatever in the drawing. Under the jury law, approved 10th March, 1871, the yearly cost of drawing juries in Union County will be about three hundred and fifty dollars; in Richland about six hundred dollars; in Charleston about one thousand doflars. That is to say, the board of jury commissioners may be in session as many days in the year as the Circuit Court is in session in the county-plus five days for revising lists. The board consists of three officers. who are entitled to three dollars a day for every day ou duty. The Times is confident that the board will be in session for quite as many days as the Legislature invites them to be. There will be a drawing for every court-three every year. At every drawing the clerk and sheriff are to be present. The figures for Union, then, will stand thur . .

A Twenty-Eight Fold Barden.

A correspondent of the Washington Patrio shows that a little ciphering will prove that the case of the South Carolina taxpayers is nearly three times as bad as a first glance would indicate.

If the collectable tax this year in South Carolina is-\$4,250,000, against \$400,000 for the year 1860, the increase of taxation is nearly eleven-fold, viz: 10.625-fold.

If the assessed ability to pay taxes is now only one hundred and eighty-three millions, against four bundred and eighty-nine millions in 1860, the decrease of such ability is nearly three-fold, viz: 2.672-fold.

Such increase of burden, when multiplied by such decrease of ability, produces a compound-or relative burden increase of more than twenty-eight-fold, viz: 28.39-fold.

War Literature of 1870.

A very interesting lecture, writes a German correspondent, was delivered at Frankfort a few days ago by the well known poet and literary historian, Rudolf Gottschall, the editor of Unsere Zeit, &c., &c., on the war literature of 1870. The lecturer first of all refuted the idea that poetry can only sing of love and the spring-time; political songs have their justification, and belong to the history of the nation. Never was there a time in Germany richer in timely poetical productions, though many do not come up to the true poetical standard. It was "Die Wacht am Rhein," composed in 1841, which struck at once the inner feelings of the nation, and many other songs which arose at that time, more especially those of Herwegh, were sung by the soldiers as they went into the field. Gottschall makes an interesting comparison between the songs of 1813 and 1870. In both the enemy is the same, but the ideas greatly differ. There was the effort to cast off the oppression of the enemy, not caring or knowing what would follow; here is a concrete effort. The singers of 1870 are conscious of the end which the nation must reach. There, it is Landwehrman fights the Frenchman as such for the insults he has suffered; here, there is no hatred of the French, only of the soldiers fighting at the command of the French Cæsars-whether Napoleon or Gam-

betta. The beautiful words which Freili-

grath dedicated to his son, going into the

field in the service of the Sanitary Depart-

terse and brilliant little speeches, caught the "giving deadly ones," is a proof that nation al batred is foreign to the Germans. After the first poetic outbursts of nations uprising, it is the resurrection of Germany in her ancient glory, the glorification of the new imperial power, which busies the German poets. Gottschall then goes into the esthetic value of the poetic productions of 1870, as compared to 1813. He finds an essential difference, especially in 1870 is the form far more perfect; a result which he attributes to the influence of Platen. "But as regards depth of feeling, of intuition and easy command of form, Freiligrath 'alone is to be compared with Korner. But "it must not be forgotten that the poetical "productions of the latter are so peculiar and so bound up with his own life that it is more difficult to make comparisons with "his poems than with those of any other poet net engaged in the tumult of war "itself. More perfect in form was undoubt-"edly Schenkendorf, whom, among the poets of to-day, Geibel most nearly approaches." He compares Grosse to Stegemann of 1813. As regards the style of poetry, but few incidents have as yet been used for the romantic. The only poem of this kind is the fine song of Freiligrath's, "The Trumpeter of Vionville."
