The Work of the May Convention.

There is evidently, in some quarters, great fear lest the Taxpayers' Convention. which assembles in Columbia in May, should ue hasty and passionate in its action, and so fail to accomplish any practical result in the way of alleviating the burdens which press upon the people. We do not know that there is any cause for this feeling. It is plain that the Convention is not political in character-that it has, by the terms of the resolutions under which it is called, no part or parcel in National or State politics. The nature of the work before it is marked out beyond the likelihood of misapprehension. That work is, to consider the financial condition of the State, to inquire into its debt, and to take steps for protecting the people, if that can be done, against a recurrence of that inordinate taxation and criminal extravagance which is robbing planter, merchant and mechanic of the fruits of the working year. The Convention may address? itself to obtaining, through the proper authorities, a postponement of the collection of the tax of 1871, due next November. It may direct its efforts to determining, with the concurrence of the Executive, the legitimate debt of the State. It may ponder the propriety of establishing an Executive Committee to remain in Columbia, as the representative of the property-holders, during the session of the Legislature-to watch corrupt schemes, and throw the moral force of the State against official profligacy and public fraud. But we do not apprehend any turbulent action. Should the Convention fail to obtain some delay in the collection of the November tax, it must calmly resolve what other course is safest and wisest to adopt. Should it fail to ascertain, from official sources, the debt of the State, it must decide, from the published reports of the Comptroller-General, what debt is to be recognized as binding, at all times, upon the people. But under no circumstances do we fear that any hot-head will be allowed to sway, or to mould, the deliberations of a body of grave and thoughtful men, who have too much at stake to be unwary in what they do. The political and financial future of South Carolina would be marred by wild and passionate action in Columbla in May. Nor is it hard to see that any vindictive and rash course, whil failing to heal our own wounds, would be a terrible blow to that great constitutional party which, all the country over, is organizing for vic tory. These things are known to the peo ple, and they will only elect such delegates -Eleven Japanese merchants have arrived as will represent them with quiet dignity as well as fidelity and zeal.

New Books.

OUR GIRLS. By Dio Lewis, A. M.; M. D., President of the Normal Institute for Physical Education, &c. New York; Harper & Bros. 1871. Charleston: Holmes's Bookhouse.

This is a shocking book. The author in sists upon treating Our Girls, the potential mothers of millions of freeborn Americans, as human beings, who are not higher than physical laws, and cannot live, without burt, in a way that would bring the toughest per son of the opposite gender to the brink of the grave. In very plain words, Dr. Lewis tells "Our Girls" how their shoes should be made, and shows them how they may walk like queens, instead of skipping like kangaroos. Low necks and short sleeves come in for their share of criticism, for, says Dr. Lewis, "the brave, earnest women who may read these pages would not pardon me if I 'discussed this vital subject in a shilly-shally, 'easy-going, disingenuous manner." Among the most striking chapters are those on "Outrages upon the Body," upon "Large vs. "Small Women," upon "Idleness among 'Girls," and upon "Sunshine and Health." This last is rich ir sound thought and practial suggestion. The "Employments of Wo-'men" are discussed at length, as are "Piano "Music," the "Study of French," and the best way of "Supporting Stockings." Dr. Lewis is flatly opposed to round dancing and theatre-going, and can always give some shrewd reason for the faith that is in him. The "Short Sermon about Matrimony" is full

of home truths. "Our Girls" is the best quoted book of the season. Extracts from it have appeared in all the leading papers, and its popularity is steadily increasing. And the reason is plain. However we may differ from Dr. Lewis on some points, we cannot upon all, and every ensible woman and girl in the country may obtain hints which they may turn to advan tage. The fair sex are joined to their idols, but if only one in a thousand follows, even n part, Dr. Lewis's advice, something will have been done towards the removal of the evils which women bring upon themselves, and which, if unchecked, must destroy that physical harmony which is the foundation of moral as well as bodily health.
