The British high commissioners have received dispatches from their home government approving of the treaty recently made by the high commissioners for the settlement of the Alabama claims question. It is stated that this treaty provides for a fixed commission to examine and pass upon the validity of all claims presented, and that the Emperor of Brazil is to be the arbitrator.

-The government management of the tele graphs in England is working exceedingly well, and realized a revenue of over £500,000 sterling last year. A uniform rate of one shilling for ten words, all over the kingdom, has been adopted, with the result of increasing the number sent over 10,000,000 annually. Another feature is the renting of certain wires to newspapers during the night at a fixed rate of

-OI the first issue of \$20,000,000 fractional

currency, made in 1862, and known at the time as "postal currency," \$4,445,060 remains unredeemed. During the past year, \$89,418 of this currency was sent to the treasury for redemption, but the rate at which it is now received decreases so rapidly that it promises to cease entirely in another year. Not far from \$4,000,000 of the postal currency, it is believed, will never be heard from, having been lost or destroyed in circulation. Of the second issue of about \$23,000,000, made in 1863, there is still outstanding the sum of \$3,246,060. The redemption during the past year amounted to \$151,455. The poor paper upon which this i ssue was printed made it more easily destroyed than the first issue, and it is believed at the treasury that more than \$2,500,000 will never come in for redemption. The total amount of the first two issues of fractional currency lost or worn out while in circulation will, according to these estimates, exceed \$6,500,000, or about 15 per cent. of the whole issue. The sum is; of course, a clear gain to the treasury. and an entire loss to the people. It represents a small part of the cost to the country of the present system of irredeemable paper

-A fearful story of suffering is revealed in the report just published by The Gazette of India, of the tir kal or three-fold famine, of grass, grain and rain, which occurred in 1868-'69 with trightful severity over 100,000 square miles of Rajpootana, surpassing in intensity any which has occurred since 1812, and almost equalling that of 1861, of which the record is preserved, that three quarters of the cattle City is higher than the individual. A Comdied, and that man ato man. The scanty crops which struggled up in spite of the drought were swept away by a plague of locusts; cholera fastened on the starved people, and a terrible fever followed, striking down the entire population. The deaths from this latter cause alone are nut down at 20 per cent, of the inhabitants, while in some of the Marwaree districts they rose as high as one-third. Taking the most moderate of the statistics furnished, the local authorities calculate that in Marwar and Ajmere and the other districts, no less than 1,250,000 human beings died of disease and starvation. The famines or periods of unusual scarcity which afflict Rajpootana have hitherto recurred at intervals of some ten or twelve years.

.-The New Bedford Standard prints a letter from Captain Jeruegan, of the bark Roman, of that port, detailing a mutiny on board that vessel, among the Magdalena Islands. Having taken in wood and water, and being ready for sea, on the 12th of March the captain ordered the anchor hove up, when the boatsteerers and foremast hands refused to work, saying they were going on shore the next day. The captain decided to wait till morning before using force, but had the Henry rifles loaded for an emergency. While at supper the captain heard a disturbance on deck, and running up found the two mates in the hands of the mutineers. Going below for a rifle, on his return he found the cabin door fastened, and was unable to interfere, while the crew beat and cut the mates and hauled them about by ropes, finally launching boats and going ashore with all their effects. The first mate was found severely wounded and insensible in the mizzen crosstrees, and both he and the second officer were supposed to be mortally wounded. That night the captain slipped the cable and put the ship to sea, fearing that the mutineers would return and run her ashore. The mutineers numbered thirteen foremast hands and the four boatsteerers, who took with them three boats and all the whaling gear belonging to them, besides all the spare rowlocks la the ship, and several other articles belonging to the vessel.

-The notification has already been given that the Grand Duke Alexis, of Russia, son of the Czar, would visit this country this season for an extended tour, and it is now announced that he proposes sailing from Constadt about the middle of May, In an Imperial yacht, acoccupanted by an escort of four or five vessels of the Russian navy, and will probably reach New York early in the month of June. Accordingly great preparations are making at Washington to afford him a fitting welcome. The Grand Duke Alexis is the third son of the Czar. He was born on the 2d of January, 1850, and is consequently a little over twenty-one years of age. He is said to be strikingly handsome; in act, he is considered very like his illustrious grandfather, the late Czar Nicholas, who, in his day, was not only the grandest looking sovereign, but was called the sumers of cotton fabrics.

-Rev. Henry Ward Beecher has again set foot upon that path in politics which for him has always a sudden turning. We are at liberty, however, to consider that the liberal sentiments which he publishes in the Brooklyn Union are, until further notice from Plymouth Church, the honest and hearty opinions of the man. In this he is outspoken enough. He declares that the six years since the war have been wasted, that reconstruction is a failure; that the local carpet-bag governments of the South are corrupt, and that official knavery, incompetence and the "elevation of demagogues and dupes to the highest offices" marks the gross debasement of politics under which the South is suffering. Mr. Beecher denounces the exclusion of ex-rebels from office, contrasting the character of Southern representative men now with what it was before the war; and as for the policy of coercion and, the recently enacted Ku-Klux bill, he styles the former an "impertinence," and brands the latter as utterly and inexcusably unconstitutional. In forcible language he shows that nothing is safe to liberty where such outrages upon the fundamental law are committed, and concludes that the same pretext "would Justify any evasion or overthrow whatever." These are brave words, and timely; but while we welcome them as swelling the volc of popular denunciation of the enormities of a Radical Congress, we cannot forget that Mr. Beecher has before this taken just as noble and bold a stand against the wickedness of his party, only to eat his words when Plymouth Church bade him swallow.

The City Elections.

It would be pleasant to make a square fight, and elect a Mayor and Aldermen who, by their high character and distinguished personal merit, would be recognized as worthy Charleston. But we cannot have it all our own way. The Radicals are well organized, and are our superiors in voting strength. The Conservatives have no organization, and usually, up to the last moment, do their best to cut each other's throat. The policy of Noti me Tangere has been tried and has failed. We must put our shoulder to the wheel, instead of quibbling about the wagonmaker's name. The South has a practical tarn, however great the hankering after glorious past. We love our Mother State and Mother City, and their good, now and at all times, shall be our highest aim.

There is no miserable foolishuess about Charleston. We have fought and suffered. And because this people have done all their duty, and have not faltered when the red blood stained the old fields of Virginia and the Carolinas, we may now say frankly that it is their part, in Charleston, to accept any honorable compromise which is offered them. A Radical paper, published in this city, proposes, with the consent of many leading Radical politicians, to give the Conservatives nine Aldermen of Charleston, while the Radicals take nine Aldermen and the Mayor. This is a compromise, and we, who have carefully considered the subfect in all its public and private bearings, say, without hesitation, that it is our duty to accept the olive branch so extended to de. Working together, and seeking the common good, we shall not go astray. The promise: will give Charleston infinitely nore than could be gained by a party fight. The Radical paper which suggests this line of action is on the right path, and will have, in this, the support of all sensible men.

The Heathen Chines at the Loom.

An experiment with Chinese labor in the manufacture of cotton goods has been tried at Baton Rouge, La., which promises to lead to important results. The superinten. dent of the State Penitentiary in that city, Mr. S. L. James, fluding that the demand for the cotton goods manufactured by the convict labor under his direction exceeded the supply, conceived the idea of doubling the production of the Peritentiary workshops by employing Chinese to work the looms at night. He accordingly secured a force of one hundred and sixty Chinese, lately employed in building one of the Alabama railroads, and set them to work, and the ease and rapidity with which they learned the business surprised even the originator of the idea. He reports that they became experts in a few weeks, and that they are now fully as good as any workmer in this branch of industry whom he has ever seen. They are exceedingly diligent, always appear to be absorbed in their employment, and seem to prefer working at the looms and spinning machines to any other form of employment. They are paid twenty-two dollars a month in gold, and even at these wages Mr. James considers them quite as cheap as convict labor. The results of this experiment are attracting much attention in the Southwest, and we understand that several cotton mills are projected in different localities in which white labor will be employed by day and Chinese labor at night. Should these plans be carried out, there is reason to believe that such enterprises would, if well managed, prove largely and permanently profitable. By keeping mills in constant operation a much larger production is possible with a given investment of capital in machinery and appliances, than if such machinery is worked only eleven hours out of twenty-four, and while the prices of goods thus produced may be lowered, the profits of manufacture will be increased. The idea of Mr. James is a good one, and the fact that the cloths manufactured at the Baton Rouge Penitentiary find an immediate and profita-
