NEWS OF THE DAY.

—Gold closed in New York, yesterday, at 141 1/2.

—Cotton closed with a steady demand at 14 1/2; sales 2559 bales.

—In Liverpool cotton closed dull; uplands 7 1/2; sales 10,000 bales.

—An ice factory is to be built at Selma, Alabama.

—In Mobile "acclimated Chinese tea-plants" are advertised for sale.

—Among the numerous presents which General Von Moltke received last winter in France was a box of fifty pairs of drawers from an American manufacturer.

—Chang, the paralyzed Siamese twin, has so far recovered as to be able to ride a crutch about the house. His brother hasn't left him a moment since he was taken ill.

—Subscriptions are being made at Washington for a testimonial to Baron Gerolt, the Prussian Minister, to be presented upon his prospective retirement from the legation.

—Mr. Wright, of New York, gave Miss Estabrook his note for \$5000, to marry him. She did so, but he got possession of the document and refused to pay it. She now sues to recover.

—A Western paper mentions an admirer of Nilsson "following her with the pertinacity of a coon dog, assuming a variety of disguises to elude the vigilance of Brignoll and his stuffed club."

—The colored men of New York City are forming several military organizations, the chief of which, the "Griffin Excelsior Colored Guard," now numbers three hundred and fifty men, and is so rapidly recruiting, that it is soon expected to reach one thousand.

—The Princess of Wales is described as looking very thin and worn, with a lovely face so full of sadness as to be pathetic. She is said to have lost in a few years all the freshness and bloom of youth, which at the time of her nuptials were the theme of praise throughout England.

—Dublin is fortunate in some of her citizens. A few years ago a great brewer restored St. Patrick's Cathedral, which had long been in a sorry plight, at an expense of \$750,000, and now a millionaire distiller offers to spend anything that may be needed in restoring the other cathedral in that city—Christ Church.

—The wives of men of sentiment are not always the most appreciative women. Jean Paul represents Siebenberg as reading one of his beautiful imaginings to his wife, who listened with eyes cast down and bated breath. As he closed, the sharer of his joys beamed forth with: "Don't put on your left stocking to-morrow, dear; I must mend that hole in it."

—The canary birds, for which the rage in this country is greater than ever before, come mainly from the Hartz Mountains—that is, their progenitors come thence, but bird fanciers and dealers breed them at home—and about the Hartz Mountains a large part of the living of the peasants comes from breeding them for the market. During this season not less than forty-five thousand have been imported by New York houses, from which they are sent to all parts of the country. About fifty varieties have been bred.

—A learned German doctor mentions three instances among his relations and friends that shows strikingly the unfeeling love of reading among Germans. One officer in the landwehr before Paris asked his wife to send him Krant's "Kritik of Pure Reason." The son of the Prussian minister of justice, when before Paris, wrote home for books, and his father sent him the "Institutes" of Justinian. A Heidelberg student, who was called away to serve as a private in the artillery, and was first before Metz, and then through the campaigns against the Loire army, suffered great hardships in the field; but the only complaint in his home letters was that he could get no books.

—Ladies are carrying parasols with long, heavy handles and long points—using them as walking sticks, and as a lady has about as much idea of using a cane as a man has of a fan. It is extremely ludicrous to behold the operation. First, you're reminded of a flat-boat on the Mississippi, with some energetic ruffian shoving her along in the mud; then, as she comes nearer, protruding the harmless sidewalk, you think of men who've been spearing eels, till finally you see she is not acting a charade, and begin to pity her for a poor blind girl, but all of sudden find it's only a girl of the period trying to walk with an overgrown case that has a slight eruption of parasol broken out along its spine.

—A fantastical story is told of the coat-arms of the Bismarck family, which consists of a clover-leaf entwined by three nettles-leaves. The chronicle runs that one of the maidens of this family, a beauty called Gertrude, being courted by many admirers, selected one of her first cousins. However, there came a rough baron from the German Ocean, accompanied by a hundred horsemen, to ask her hand. When it was refused, he took the castle by storm, killed Gertrude's father, and finally embraced the maiden, remarking, "You golden clover of my heart, you are no nettle and do not sting; I am a nettle when I wish, and can sting, and so do nettles ever sting the one who would break a clover leaf of the Bismarcks," quietly smote the adventurous lover under the fifth rib with a dagger, injuring him so that he died.

—The Thames embankment, according to the Pall Mall Gazette, has not so far appreciable extent relieved the Strand and Fleet Street from the crowd of passengers and constant current of vehicles which block up those thoroughfares of London. The deserted appearance of this significant highway is remarked upon as something very striking, since for some reason or other omnibus will not ply, cabs will not litter, and crowds will not congregate on the embankment when has been constructed at so much trouble and expense for the good of the people of London. One reason assigned for this desertion is, that Londoners like shops, and are better pleased in being jammed together in front of plate-glass windows than in inspecting the small trees planted along the embankment.

—A row of shops running from one end of the embankment to the other would, it is stated, have made it as popular as the Burlington Arcade, which is constantly crowded with gazers.

—Ex-Commissioner David A. Wells writes an interesting letter to the N. W. York Nation on the prospective rate of interest in this country for the next quarter century. Mr.

Wells assumes that the rate of interest depends on four conditions—1, the productive power of labor; 2, the supply of capital; 3, the degree of risk in loans; 4, the state of the currency. For the next generation, at least, the fertile land of the United States cannot be wholly occupied; and there can be no sensible decline in the productivity of labor, or in the demand for capital. As for the further supply of capital, it is evident that there can be no accumulation of it in this country beyond the immediate wants of our own people. Europe is now lending money to its own peoples, on advanced rates of interest, and there is no reason to believe that capital from that source will be furnished to lower the present rate of interest here during the next generation. The limited success of the five per cent. loan shows that capital now commands a higher rate, and speculative investment threatens to keep the market active and unstable. As to the risk of loans in this country, our reputation as borrowers is not the highest in the world, nor is it likely to improve under the present management. Mr. Wells quotes with approval Mr. Amasa Walker's remark that the wide fluctuations in the rate of interest, which are due to the use of a currency made up largely of credit, may be expected to increase in violence and frequency hereafter, as the "mixed currency system" is extended through the commercial world. Mr. Wells concludes that there is at present no prospect of a general reduction of the rate of interest in this country for many years to come. Seven per cent he puts as the lowest average, with an exception in favor of national State loans, with which compensating advantages are offered to make up for the reduced rate of interest.

—The New York Tribune, in announcing its intention to dispatch a corps of special correspondents to the Southern States to "write up" the Ku-Klux, remarks:

"We do not choose to await the investigations of any committee of Congress. The evidence taken by any such official body will inevitably be affected by the prejudice and the fears of the witnesses. Our correspondents will send us more independent and intelligent statements than any committee-man or envoy could possibly do. We expect in the next few months to let in such light upon this tangled web of charges and denials, that ignorance of the true state of affairs will no longer be excusable to Congress or the country."

One of the Tribune's correspondents has found his way to Chester in this State, from which point he writes with a lively, if unwelcome pen. We reproduce his letter in full in another column that our people may see the colors in which they and their sayings and doings are painted for the edification of the country at large.
