-The little ship City of Ragusa is to sail from New York this week for Liverpool. Two men and a suicidal dog will aid the captain in shivering his tarry toplights.

-At an auction sale of old English pottery and porcelain at Sotheby's, in London, re cently, an old teapot was sold for one hundred and ninety guineas.

-No less than two hundred and twenty-four life insurance companies have been woun. up in Great Britain within the last twentysix years. This is twice as many as now exist

-Experts differ in their estimates of the coming vintage of California, the lowest figure named being 8,000.000 gallons, and the highest 12,000,000. There is reason to believe that the vintage of 1871 will not fall much under 10,000,000 gallons.

-It is said that a tourist travelling continuously, without any stoppages, can now go around the world in eighty days, making the entire journey by railway and steamship, and going by way of Liverpool, the Suez Canal, Ceylon, Singapore, Hong Kong, Yokohama, San Francisco and the Pacific Railway.

-For some reason the medical students of Paris do not join hands with the commune. They were recently convoked to confer with that body on the reorganization of the medical school. By a majority of two-thirds they refused any conference with the Commune, and separated with cries of "Vive la Republique!"

-Bismarck suffered a deteat recently in subject of allowing fees to its members. Bismarck opposed the message in an arrogant and self-satisfied speech, and was much astonished and disgusted when the house voted for the bill by 185 yeas to 136 nays. The plea for the allowance of these fees is, the small allowance to legislators would barely suffice to cover their actual expenses.

-M. Paul Dupont, the great Paris printer, conducted a business before the war which vielded him two hundred and fifty thousand dollars per annum, and divided ten per cent. of his profits with his workmen according to their individual merit. The establishment has, or had, its schools, baths, reading-rooms, libraries, savings banks and gardens for the benefit of its employees. It proved one of the most successful applications of the co-operative system ever known in France.

-A New York letter says: "The mystery vens House on April 29 is cleared up. Miss Julia Fitzgerald, employed in a Broadway store, saw the satchel of the deceased, marked K. E. Harrington, and recognized it as belonging to her friend, Mrs. K. E. Harrington, whose maiden name was Eliza B. Seiden, niece of Lieutenaut-Governor Seiden and General Cass. . he went on the stage when young and married Andrew Harrington, who, it is alleged, became a gambler and deserted her three years ago, and is thought to be in New Orleans. Mrs. South, of Mulberry, Ohio, who read an account of the suicide, has written to the proprietor of the Stevens House. stating that she believes the woman to be Miss Selden."

-A Boston gentleman spent the night of April 9th on the summit of Mount Vesuvius while that volcano was in a state of eruption. He describes the crater as having three throats, so to speak, which were dissimilar in their action. One was very violent in its action, and through the night, at longer or shorter intervals, it was terrific, and consisted in tremendous and sudden explosions infinitely louder than those of the neaviest artillery, accompanied by the eruption to the height of between one hundred and two hundred feet of immense volleys of glowing stones and red-hot cinders, which spread into magnificent bouquets of great brilliancy. Subterranean rumblings sometimes preceded the explosions, which shock the mountain to its base. From the second throat flowed a coplous, compressed volume of smoke and flame, as from a furnace, and with no noise except that of the constant roaring of the flames. The third throat threw out volumes of black smoke and great bouquets of glowing cinders, but with much less violence than ei her of the other two, and was accompanied with a great blowing noise, very much like that of an ascending rocket of vast proportions. The Franco-German Treaty

"Treaties are made to be broken." So say the satirists, and certainly not without eason. For whenever the will of an auto. erat, or the temper of a nation becomes restive under the restrictions of a treaty, they easily find a protest for setting the contract aside, just as lawyers have always been able to drive that proverbial coach-and-four through any act of Parliament. To be sure, the violators of a treaty must be prepared to fight. And for this reason it has come to pass that treaties are binding only on weak States and minor powers. The great and strong are a law unto themselves. It is sad to be forced to make such an admission, for it seems all but conceding that might makes right. But as long as human nature remains as it has been heretofore, and as it is now we fear that constitutions, laws and treaties, however carefully framed, and however hedged round with checks and balances, pains and penalties, will be but tempo rary-mere compromises; the work of a hoard of experts, formulating accomplished facts, nothing more. A treaty, therefore, may be considered binding for the time being, but cannot be considered a finality The treaty of 1815, perhaps one of the most labor ously constructed compacts between nations in the annals of history, was, doubtless, the best agreement it was possible to make at the time by the high contracting powers represented at Vienna; but before many years had elapsed, one after another of those powers found what seemed to them good reasons for picking holes in it, till at last the old instrument was found to be all tattered and torn-in fact, past mending-There has now been another shuffle of the cards, and the map of Europe has once more been reconstructed, though not by Napoleon, whose fingers for years had a strange itching for this job. History here again repeats itself The Treaty of Vienna, the most important of modern times, as we have stated, followed the downfall of Napoleon the First, and the Treaty of Frankfort is the result of the fall of Napoleon the Third. Time must tell how lasting this latter compact is to prove. Its element of strength lies in the fact that it is the legitimate outgrowth of the struggle for nationality, one of the leading factors in the history of European civilization of the present century. Little by little has this great temple been constructed. First, we have the war for the the Cerman Reichstag, on the much-bruited independence of Greece; then the revolution ending in the establishment of the Kingdom of Beigium; next Italy, struggling for au tenomy, thred of being a mere "geographi-"cal idea;" and lastly Germany, "unifying "herself"-as the phrase awkwardly has it. As a matter of course there are heads bruised and bones broken in these struggles for new boundaries. Where there is a victor there is always a victim; and war is a rough game. Individual rights, or the law of nations, are not unfrequently set aside, or

path to the object sought. This is the case in regard to the treaty just concluded between Germany and France. Alsace and Lorraine are to be Germanizednot merely upon the nationality principle, for if it were left to the plebiscite, the dwelapprounding the saigide of the dady at the lers in those two provinces might take it into their leads to choose to remain Frenchmen. Military considerations require the annexation; though "nationality" is given as one of the reasons for the step; and hence none but the German-speaking provinces of France have been annexed. The German people entertain the hope, sincerely, we beheve, that by kindly treatment the consciousness of their German nationality will be revived in the people of Alsace and Lorraine. The recent events in Paris have certainly facilitated the task of the German statesmen; and the growing lustre of the German Empire will also have its effect. Thus we read that already in Strasbourg a meeting of about ninety maires has been held, at which a series of resolutions were adopted asking for the establishment of a complete University in their city, and also for the immediate representation of the peo-

If the new provinces, as is likely to be the case, will soon be completely Germanized, the transfer of about 5000 square miles and over one and a half millions of inhabitants somewhat affects the relative position of France and Germany among the Great Powers of Europe: France, which before the war had 38,000,000 of inhabitants, will be reduced to about 36,000,000; Germany, which had likewise 38,000,000, will be raised to about 40, 000,000. This disparity, it will be seen, is after all not very great; and, as far as it depends on population alone, France is very far, as some of her distressed sons feared, from being reduced to a second rank power. counted in, sue has a population considerably exceeding that of Prussia. most important of all the consequences of the Treaty of Frankfort. In the opinion of the German people, the edifice of National Unity is still incomplete. Of the countries which until 1866 were represented in the Federal Diet, two are still outside of the new Empire, the German provinces of Austria and Luxembourg. The latter is reported to be on the eve of reconnecting itself with Germany. At all events the Luxembourg question has now dwindled down to utter nsignificance in comparison with the question as to the fate of German Austria. Leaving out of account the Germans in Hungary, there is in Austria a compact German population of about 8,009,000, who take the deepest interest in the greatness and the glory of the German nation, and who now cannot help regarding the Emperor and the Reichstag of Berlin as the great bannerbearers of the German interests.

A WESTERN contemporary makes an in teresting estimate of the gain in Congressional representation which must accrue to the Southern States under the new census. By the emancipation of the slave population two-fifths of that aggregate, or say 1,680,-000, have been added to the representative basis of these States. In 1860, out of 253 representatives, the slaveholding States had 84, or one less than one-third; they will now, out of 280 members, be entitled, under the census of 1870, to 104, or ten more than one-third of the whole house.
