Kepler lived in an age when the "blind "force of atoms" was not so well understood as it is to-day. Unable to account for the motions of the planets, he ascribed them to angels who were sent by the Lord of Heaven to attend to this special service. Spinoza saw much deeper than Kepler, and uttered a great, a sublime truth when he said, "we do "not know what matter can do." Science every day confirms Spinoza's dictum. It has no eyes, no nose, no ears, no mouth, no stomach, no lungs, no heart, no brain, no approach to muscular fibre; not a trace of anything resembling a nervous system, no limbs of any description, no division of parts, no segments. Yet it is alive, it moves, it pushes out a part of its cell-wall, knows when and where to find its prey; how to double itself around it and to digest it.

Well may we say with Spinoza that we do not know what matter can do, and well may we add with Herbert Spencer, in his last book, that if mind is to be defined in terms of matter, matter in its turn is truly definable only in terms of mind; and the wisdom and power of the Unknowable Cause are displayed more amazingly, perhaps, in the least, or what we are accustomed to call the least, than in the greatest of things.
