### The Charleston Market.

THE WEEK ENDING THURSDAY, AUGUST 17. THE CROPS. -After a protracted drought, which inflicted much damage and has largely lessened the provision and injured the cotton crop of this State, the weath r changed, and much of the past week was marked by good rains in this vicinity. Its action on the crops, if limited in amount, will be beneficial. The first bale of new cotton in this market reached here early in the week, from Macon, Georgia, and was the growth of that State. It classed Liverpool middling, and sold at 25%c 7 h. The second, and the first received the product of this State, came to hand on Tuesday, classed middling, and sold at 25e P ib. The third was a bale of Florida uplands, classed good ordinary, and sold at 200 % lb. The arrivals of new bales at various Boints in the South are increasing, and would indicate a forward state of the plant in many sections.

THE RECEIPTS .- The arrivals at the cotton ports for the week up to Friday last were 9454 hales, against 10,472 the week before, and 5517 for the period last season. At New Orleans the rehipts were 3214 hales, in contrast with 895 bales the week of the year before.
