The following additional regulation relating to claims for the refunding of taxes is hereby

No claim or application hereafter made for the relunding of taxes will be entitled to con-sideration by the commissioner of internal revenue unless the same shall be filed with the commissioner within two years from the date of the payment of the tax, or, in case of claims already accrued, within two years from this date.

The centre of the gate rises in successive ornamental scrolls to the height of fifteen feet, and besides the beautiful stars are finished off in handsome style by ornamental chains and tassels of wire.
