They were taken to the Guardhouse, and having been brought before the Mayor, yesterday morning, were sentenced each to pay a fine of five dollars or spend ten days in the House of Correction.

SEIRNISH ON THE MALL.-Four white boys were brought before Trial Justice T. J. Ma key, yesterday morning, charged with an assault and battery upon a like number of colore 1 juveniles. DEATH OF DR. B. A. RODRIGUES .- At a late hour on Wednesday night, Dr. B. A. Rodrigues was prostrated by a stroke of apoplexy at his residence, in Meeting street, opposite the Circular Church, the attack terminating fatally at five clock vesterday afternoon. Dr. Rodrigues was born in this city in 1815, and at an early age entered the office of Dr. Henry Frost, where he be gan the study of medicine, and was enabled, with the aid of the venerable doctor, to take the lectures and graduate at the Charleston Medical College. He determined to devote his life to the branch of dentistry, and became a pupil of the celebrated Dr. Brewster, who afterwards removed to Europe, and died recently at Versailles. For the past thirty-five years Dr. Rodrigues has been a practicing dentist in this city, where he soon established a high reputation for skil and uniform success. A short time before the late war he was elected vice-president of the United States Dental Association. The same earnest determination which characterized him in the study of medicine and dentistry was maintained in his subsequent practice, and at length placed this self-made man at the head of his profession in this State.

His funeral will take place this afternoon, at 3 o'clock, from his late residence in Meeting street.

A FEMALE SHOPLIFTER AT WORK .- Yesterday morning, a white woman of respectable appearance, Sarah Daley by name, entered the store of Messra. Stone.& Marshall, No. 143 Meeting street, and called for some calico. She stood by the counter for some time, apparently examining the cloth while the clerk was attending to some customers at the back part of the store, and presently went out of the door. A small colored girl, who was selling peanuts in front of the store, seemed to have been watching her, for soon after the woman left, the girl went in to the clerk and told him the roman had been stealing clo h. The clerk went to the counter, and immediately missing the roll of calico, hurried out in pursuit, but the woman was not to be seen up or down the street. He passed her by in his hurry, for she had merely gone a few ste ps down the street and then turn ed aside in a gateway to conceal her prize. This difficulty, apparently unsurmountable, was e sily accomplished by one of those manœuvres impossible to thieves of the male kind by reason of the nature of their habiliments. A few mysteribas jerks and twitches and rustle as of falling leaves, and the woman made her appearance with the tell-tale calico securely hidden. The clerk of a neighboring store had observed the dodge, and stopped the woman with h r bundle. Her confusion told all, and the clerk escorted her back to estore whence she had originally made he exis with the calico.
