

THE REIGN OF TERROR.

FURTHER ACCOUNTS FROM THE PROCLAIMED COURTES.

A Powerful Letter to the Hon. Reverdy Johnson.

[From the Baltimore Sun.] The following letter was received on Saturday by the Hon. Reverdy Johnson, to whom it was written. He has placed it in our hands, at the request of the writer, and tells us that he knows that he is a gentleman of high character, and that his statements may be confidently relied upon.

ROCK HILL, YORK DISTRICT, S. C., October 26, 1871.

Hon. Reverdy Johnson, Baltimore, Md.

DEAR SIR:—I am one of my countrymen who have been arrested and thrown into the common jail by the United States soldiers without charge or accusation, without form or warrant of law, without the shadow of right or justice.

Before the suspension of the writ of *habeas corpus* profound quiet prevailed in this section of country; men were pursuing their business avocations in the most peaceful manner, and a season of prosperity was beginning to dawn upon us; but now words are almost inadequate to describe the reign of terror that is existing among us.

Our country is being ravaged by the wholesale, burning of our property, and the tearing of our women and children, hurrying the prisoners off to jail, and cramming them in dungeons and jails, and giving the prisoners as the cause of his arrest; no hearing is allowed him.

More Arrests—Depopulation and Fears of Guerrilla Warfare.

The New York Herald has the following special dispatch from Newberry, S. C., of the 27th October:

Adairs in Laurens County are the same as in Newberry; there has never been a Ku-Klux raid in the county. At the first of the year there was a riot between the whites and negro militia, in which several were killed, and since then there have been no trouble whatever.

Thus far Spartanburg, Union and York counties have been the principal county of operation, but it is believed that the black lists for the other counties are made out, and that arrests will begin in a few days.

The following information was brought by a gentleman from Yorkville, yesterday, of the situation of affairs there: Two hundred Ku Klux in all have made voluntary confession of their connection with the organization, and are all being allowed to the authorities, toally disgusted with their connection with it.

One hundred and two are confined in the jail at Yorkville. These are the men who have been arrested by the officers.

One person confined among this number was ascertained to have been innocent of the charge against him, and he was released.

FIRE-PROOF BUILDINGS.

THE WEATHER THIS DAY.

WASHINGTON, November 1.

The area of high barometer in the Ohio Valley has been broken up by a cold front, with brisk northerly winds, to-night for a short time from Virginia to New York, followed by partially cloudy and clear weather on Thursday in the Middle States.

ALSIAN COTTON COMPLICATIONS.

The complications among the cotton manufacturers of Germany and France, arising from the annexation of Alsace and from the new commercial treaty, are interesting.
