from Havana, arrived in the harbor, with the body of Captain Williams, who died during the passage, of yellow fever. Instead of receiving a seaman's burial, the remains had been boxed up and directed to Cap ain Card, of this city, marked chloride of lime. The coffin was taken from the quarantine ground up to Fort Johnson, where it was interred at 12 M. yesterday, in the United States burying ground, in the neighborhood of the fort. The corpse was quite black, death having taken place on Tuesday last, and exhibited every symptom of viru ent yellow fever.

THE SAVANNAH YELLOW FEVER .- A telegram was received here yesterday by Dr. Lebby, from Dr. J. C. Habersham, the health officer of Savannah, which contradicts the statement as to the continued presence of yellow fever in that city. Dr. Habersham admits that there were a few cases there between the 15th and 31st of October, but does not mention the number. Savannah must either have been visited with a heavy frost on the sly, or their yellow fever is of a most obliging type, and disappears in time not to injure the fall trade of the city.
