NEWS OF THE DAY.

-Gold closed yesterday at 10[all. -The New York cotton market closed steady at 19c for up'ands; sales 3500 bales. -The Liverpool market closed strong; uplands 94a93d, Orleans 94d; sales 18,000 bales.

-The average fall of snow at Clacinnati yesterday, was four and a half inches. -The Canadian Colonization Society, composed of British subjects, has passed a resolu tion favoring the annexation of Canada to the

-The Louisiana State fair was formally opened at New Orleans yesterday, fifteen thousand visitors being present. The fair

continues until December 3. -A countryman bargained with a California photographer for a half-length picture of himself at half price, and when the artist delivered a fine view of his subject from the walstband down, the victimized sitter indulged in remarks more forcible than polite.

-The public schools of Texas, according to a recent act of the Legislature of that State, are to be supported by the proceeds of the sales of the public lands, and one-fourth of all the taxes raised are to be applied to the same

-▲ New York paper says : "David Dudley Field has been employed as Republican counsel to assist Reverdy Johnson in the argument of Ku-Klux cases in South Carolina. It is expected that Judges Bond and Bryan will disagree in opinion, which will have the effect of bringing the case before the Supreme Court at Washington, and thus test the constitutionality of the law."

-The Navasota (Texas) Tablet of the 4th instant says: "One thousand persons are about to settle on lands just outside of town, with every facility offered to them by the owners, and at a nominal rent for some of the best land in the country. A Catholic church and school-house will be built for them; also, quarters. A priest will reside in their midst-There are thousands of acres which will be offered with the same inducements to immigrants settling in our midst."

-The vine was planted in California nearly one hundred years ago by the first missionaries. But now the grape region consists of a vast area of mountain lands, too high and dry for other crops. On this soil the grape flourishes and produces better wine than in the moist valleys. It is estimated that there are thirty million vines growing in California, while the number is increasing every year. Los Angelos is the cldest vine-growing county, and leads in the production of wine. As the vines grow older the productiveness becomes greater. The wine interests is destined to assume magnificent proportins in Culifornia.

-During the past three years forty-nine of the August meteors have been so successfully identified, at different stations, that their distance from the earth could be calculated. Their average height at appearance was found to be about seventy-seven miles; at disappearance, fifty-four miles. The velocity, relatively to the earth, was estimated at thirty-four to thirty-seven miles per second. Astronomical theorists long ago set down the average velocity at thirty-eight miles to the second. The above observations show that their reasoning brought them very near the correct figures.

-In Munich it is required by law that every corpse, whatever the cause of death may be, shall be publicly exposed at the cemetery before the burial service can take place. The rigid features of the dead can be clearly seen through the broad windows of the room, their bodies elegantly draped and covered with flowers. In the right hand of each is a small cord that reaches upward to a bell. A watchman is always at hand. Burial alive is su; posed to be impossible under this arrangement. Herr Trieber, author of a new work in German on "The Spartan Constitution," finds that the Greeks themselves were divergent to the extent of a century as to the time when Lycurgus lived; that all existing accounts of him are traceable to an obscure writer named Euphorus, whose works have perished, fragmen's only surviving in Plutarch and Aristotle, and that Euphorus was untrustworthy, and an inventor of names and dates. All, therefore, that remains is the possibility of there having once lived in Sparta a man named Lycurgus, but of his age, life and work we have no trustworthy account whatever.

It is a pity that such testimony has been deemed necessary in the case; but since it is given, it is to be hoped that with it ends the poor sensation.

The State Debt.

The statement of the public debt prepared by Mr. Treasurer Parker, as printed in THE NEWS of yesterday, is ample proof, if such were needed, that there has been monstrous extravagance, as well as a studied suppression of the truth, in the management of the fiscal affairs of the State.

According to Mr. Parker's accounts, the bonds printed by the present administration are as follows:

The \$200,000 of Sinking Fund Bonds may be properly deducted if the bonds can be produced when required, but the bonds under hypothecation are security for about \$900,000 due the Financial Agent, and it is plain that either the \$900,000 in money or the \$3,773,000 in use as collaterals must be treated as a part of the actual debt of the State.

Returning to the statement of the bonds printed, (\$22,540,000,) we find that the amount is far less than was expected. But it is not clearly explained why so many blank bonds were needed. Again, the people will require that all the bonds stated to be in hand shall be produced; also, that proof shall be given that the bonds written off as destroyed were so destroyed; also, that the \$2,953,000 mysteriously used "in ordinary "transactions, not affecting the debt," shall be properly accounted for. The Treasurer says that the facts and data are open to the public. And we hope that trusted representatives of the public will take Mr. Parker

at his word. As to the amount of bonds issued under the acts for the redemption of the bills receivable for the payment of interest, and and for the relief of the Treasury, we need only repeat that, under the letter of the law, the financial officers might issue as many bonds as were necessary to raise, in money, the sums required, viz: \$2,500,000. But it must not be forgotten that the State TEACHER OF THE PIANO-FORTE, ORGAN AND officers have, again and again, declared that the bonds issued under these three acts amounted to only the several sums author-

ized, or \$2,500,000 in all. Until the impromptu investigating commit tee of citizens shall have announced the result of their examination, we refrain from analyzing more thoroughly Mr. Parker's exhibit. We may say, however, that we are more and more convinced that, as one result of the present agitation, the people will obtain an accurate statement of the public debt. By hook or by crook, this will be had.

Industrial Partnerships.

Co-operation has not yet done much for the operative classes in the United States. were failures; the building associations of the same State proved mostly unsuccessful the afforts at co-operative distribution in the Novelty Iron Works, in New York, came to nothing. Brewster, carriage makers, of New York, state that finding, as their business enlarged, they were necessarily more and more thrown out of communication and sympathy with their employees, and that thus misunderstandings might arise which would lead to strikes, and knowing that a valuable business like theirs would be greatly injured by a sudden strike, they resolved to give their workmen a permanent interest in their busi-

They resolved to pay their men the highest wages of the trade, and in addition a certain share of the profit, before capital or lleved, produce a currency expansion and the managers were paid, and to put each speculation in securities somew't analogous year by itself, so that in the event of the

employers. The percentage with which they comnenced was ten per cent. of the profits.
