INVESTING.—Among the recent transfers of real property in New York City, the Sun notices one of the lot at the northwest corner of the Boulevard and Eightieth street, one hundred and two feet square, from Francis Worth to Charles P. Leslie, of Charleston, S. C., for the slight consideration of fifty-nine thousand dollars.

BRICKBATTING A LADY.—A little after nine o'clock on Monday morning, John Singleton, a colored boy, threw a brick at another boy in America street, and instead of hitting the boy, struck a lady in the face who was passing. The lady was badly cut, but did not appear against the young scapegrace before the Mayor. The prisoner was consequently discharged for want of evidence against him.

COTTON FOR FOREIGN PORTS.—Mr. W. P. Hall cleared yesterday, at this port, the Spanish bark Sirio, for Havre, with seven hundred and ninety-four bales upland cotton; the Spanish bark Georgia, for Barcelona, with six hundred and seventy-five bales upland cotton, and the Spanish brig Ysabella, for the same port, with four hundred and fifty-six bales upland cotton.

Messrs. J. A. Esolow & Co. cleared for Liverpool the American Bark Albina, with 2503 bales upland cotton, weighing 1,140,670 pounds, and valued at \$211,024.

CLUBS AND STARS.—Wm. Randall, arrested for trespassing upon the premises of Mr. Geo. Immons, had his case deferred until to-day. Thos. Suarez, lodged for desertion from the Spanish bark Sirio, was delivered to the captain.

One bacchanalian who succumbed to the influence of the drowsy god on East Bay street, woke up in the Guardhouse, and next morning paid a fine of one dollar for his spree. A white goat, found at large in Spring street, was delivered to the owner upon payment of a fine of one dollar.

Nine persons applied for lodgings at the Guardhouse and were duly discharged next morning.

SWINDLER IN CUSTODY.—Between twelve and one o'clock on Monday, James Huohet, alias James Drayton, was surprised in one of his haunts up town by Assistant-Chief Fraser, who proceeded to arrest him. Drayton made a fierce resistance, but at length succumbed. As he was being led off, Benjamin Smith, his companion, interfered with the officer, and attempted to rescue Drayton. Smith speedily found himself numbered with the prisoners, and, with Drayton, was locked up in the Guardhouse. Drayton was arrested some days ago for swindling a colored man from the country out of ten dollars by the strap game, and had been allowed to go at large on his promise to find out the other swindler who had assisted in the job. Since then he has disappeared, and, nothing having been heard of him, the officers were notified to arrest him. Drayton was turned over to a trial justice for prosecution, and Smith was dismissed with a reprimand.

THE DEATH OF MR. JOSEPH WALKER.—A telegram was received yesterday from Aiken announcing the death, at that place, of Mr. Joseph Walker, who had been a prominent merchant in Charleston for above thirty years.

Mr. Walker began business in this city as a manufacturing stationer in 1833, and in 1852 was appointed superintendent of the Bath Paper Mills, in which concern he was a large stockholder. He remained in charge of the mills for a number of years. During the Confederate war he served as commissary-general for the State of South Carolina, which position he resigned on account of falling health, and went to Europe as one of the agents of the Confederate Government. After the war he resumed business in Charleston, but was forced, by increasing debility, to withdraw. He again went to Europe, returning some months ago to this city. He afterwards went to Aiken, where he remained up to the time of his death, which was caused by consumption.

Mr. Walker was an amiable man and a public-spirited citizen. His death will be generally regretted.

THE TRAGEDY OF RICHARD III. was presented to a fine house at the Academy last evening. The title role was filled by Mr. Harry Seymour, an actor of the ultra-robust school, whose idea of the royal Plantagenet seemed to waver between a facetious shallow buffoon and a blustering ruffian, the whole result being something about as different from the profound and subtle conception embodied in Shakespeare's creation as can well be imagined. Where so little can be said for the Star, it is pleasant, however, to be able to praise. The armaments, the armor, banners, dresses and accoutrements of the company are much above the usual display on such occasions, and are very creditable to the management. The rival armies of York and Lancaster, if not quite numbering the hundred supernumeraries promised in the bills, yet sufficed to fill very comfortably the stage, and made a fine appearance. To-night the Merchant of Venice will be played, after which Mr. Seymour will recite the Masonic poem "The Level and the Square," in honor of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of South Carolina, the performance to conclude with La Chalef, with Miss Effie Johns as Lisette.
