The Conservative Armory.

Did Comptroller Neagle report these facts to the public in such shape that they might appreciate the whole horrid truth? He did not! Again, Mr. Neagle is one of the Financial Board which had control of the Sterling Fanding Bonds. Did he raise his voice in warning when it was attempted to thrust these bonds on the market in deliance of the protest of the taxpayers? He did not! No! He stood by the Ring, fought for the Ring, and shared with the Ring while the financial skies were fair, and it is useless for him to deny that he did his part in con-

juring up the storm. It is, indeed, rather too much when this official, steeped to the lips in shame, attempts to curry favor with the honest people of the State, by professing his personal ignorance of the truth, and by whining and lamentation over the State's financial ruin. If he did not know the truth, he failed in his duty, utterly and ignominiously. If he did know the trath, he is even guiltier than the men upon whom he would shift a responsibility which he will not be permitted to escape.
