-It was proposed a few days ago, in New York, that a statue of Horace Greeley be purchased and placed in Printing House Square, similar to the one recently erected in honor of Benjamin Franklin on that spot. The subscriptions have already reached \$11,000, but \$30,000 is wanted.

- Marlo, the famous tenor, now nearly sixty years old, was married lately in London at the Catholic Church, in Marylebone, to Lady Harriet Beaufort, a member of an aristocratic English family. The new Marchloness of Candia is only twenty-two, years old. Mario will take up his residence in Paris, His two daughters-who might be taken for their stepmother's sisters-will reside with him.

Mr. Greeley says he don't want a statue while he lives, and adds, "after he is deadan eyent which he does not care to hasten, even for the sake of a statue-if any should see fit to pile granite or marble above his dust, he can make no objection; but, so long as he shall remain in the flesh, he is content with the stones thrown at him promiscuously, and would rather not have any of them consoildated into a statue."

-The British Government has formally announced the occupation of the South African diamond fields on the 17th of last November. There is now no doubt of this action by the British authorities-hitherto rumored only. The change is said to have been highly ac ceptable to the colonists among the diamondseekers, but the Dutch of the Transvaal Republic indignantly protested against this additional evidence of British greed and disregard of the rights of others.

-The great powder explosion which took place on the 18th ult., at the Greenwich arshes, near London, occurred in a cartridge factory where there were several hundred cases of ball cartridges.
