THE WEATHER THIS DAY.

WASHINGTON, April 14. An area of low barometer is advancing east-ward over Nebraska and Dakota, and will probable move over Southern Lake Michigan on Monday, with diminishing pressure throughout the Mississippi Valley, gradually extending to the South Atlantic and Middle States, with southerly to westerly winds and increased cloudiness. The area of rain will extend eastward over the upper lake region and the Western and Middle States on Monday, and probably over the South Atlantic States.
