and rest, when, without a moment's warning, the enemy swept down upon the company, seized their weapons of defence, and then devoted themselves to the execution of their costly-acquired prisoners. The wagons were pillaged of their abundant stores and rolled together, after which their helpless drivers were tied to them and the whole pile set on fire, while the cruel captors kept up the dance of death until their victims' shrieks ceased to afford music, when, gathering up the spoils and taking the miles, they decamped. The government troops who sought to punish the traitors failed, and the correspondents who gleaned the details of the affair say that the unusual atrocity was due to the greater savagery of the Indians' new allies, the black troops.

The Baltimore Convention.

General Kershaw, in a letter to Colonel Simeon Fair, advises against sending delegates from South Carolina to the National Democratic Convention, mainly because such a step might hinder the possibility of a Reform Republican movement in this State. We cannot see that there is any solid ground for apprehending so undesirable a result. The object in sending a Democratic delegation to Baltimore is to vote against a party nomination, and in favor of hearty cooperation with the Liberal Republican movement. And a like policy obtains in State affairs. The people are ready to support any decent Republican candidates whom Republicans may put in the field; but they know that it would be the height of folly to nominate Democratic candidates for State offices, and under no circumstances will they do anything of the kind. This is the bent of public sentiment; and the participation of South Carolina in the Baltimore Convention, while increasing the chances of the election of Mr. Greeley, could not, in our opinion, cause the people to change or modify their fixed resolution to leave the State elections in the hands of the contending Republican factions. We may add that what information we have regarding the South Carolina Reform Republicans leads us to believe that they are wholly indifferent as to the action of the Democracy in regard to the National Convention. What they ask is that there shall be no Democratic State ticket, which is no more than every sensible man is ready to concede.

There is reason for hoping that the precious scheme of calling an extra session of the Legislature will fall through. It is vigorously opposed by the Radical press, and by several of the prominent members of the Senate and House.
