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Narrow Gauge Railroads.

On the nineteenth of June delegates representing all the narrow gauge railroad companies in the United States will assemble in convention at St. Louis.

The advantages claimed for the narrow gauge system rest upon the general principle that, with sufficient width of track for safety and speed, all further increase of width renders imperative an increase in the weight of engines and cars in proportion to that which increases capacity, or in other words, the "dead weight" of a train increases with the width of the track.

It is generally assumed that the narrow gauge principle is of recent origin. This is a mistake, for roads of 23 1/2-inch and 39-inch gauge have been in operation with success, both in England and on the continent, for many years.

It is true that with one exception, (the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad,) the projected lines are short ones, and that they are deemed better adapted for places that are not thickly settled.

Early and Sheridan.

The bravery and other soldierly qualities (?) evinced by General Phil Sheridan in riding over a few half-starved and broken down Confederate cavalry, in burning numberless houses and barns in the Shenandoah Valley, and butchering a number of helpless Indians, squaws and paposes, and in thinking that the late battles of the Franco-German war were gala occasions, gotten up by King William and Emperor Napoleon as a tribute to his prowess in Virginia and on the Western prairies, have elicited for him little else than loathsomeness for his inhumanity, contempt for his military reputation, and ridicule for his overweening conceit.

"I am a little astonished that an officer of such really good sense as General Barnard undoubtedly possesses should refer to the letter of General Sheridan, 'characterizing' my statements as 'falsifying history,' as any evidence at all. That letter, written and published when I was out of the country, and he a military satrap, domineering with ruffian insolence over a down-trodden people, if it characterized anything at all, undoubtedly by its whole tone and temper characterized and stamped its author as an ass and a vulgar blackguard, inflated with an overweening conceit of his own importance derived from position attained by having risen to the surface, like scum, in the last ebullitions of an expiring struggle."
