GREELEY AND HIS CRITICS.

Some Popular Fallacies about the Tribune Philosopher Exposed.

Among the popular failacies concerning Horace Greeley are a few which we will point out and correct. He is thought to be deficient in business tact or executive force. On the conirary, those who have been long and intimately associated in business with him know that he has a staunch and excellent judgment that he has a staunch and excellent judgment in all affairs of money and property. His governance of the Tribune—a great institution of which he is not only the outward figure-head, but the central soul—has, from the beginning of its history, and particularly during the last dozen years, been a signal executive success. Mr. Greeley has always had as much to do with the pecuniary as with the editorial management of his paper. To preside with skill over such and establishment—involving, as such an effice does, a daily control and direction of hundreds of employees—calls into exercise the very highest executive and administrative faculties. No better tribute can be paid to the success with which Mr. Greeley gets along with his associates than the fact that the same men remain year after year in the same stamen remain year after year in the same sta-tions, with as little change as among the feu-

dal retainers of a medieval lord.

The foreman in the press-room—now a bearded patriarch—is the same man who helped Mr. Greeley more than thirty years ago to get out the first copy of the Tribune. The foreman in the composing room did the same. Thus, two heads of departments have remained at their posts for a third of a century, and both at their posts for a third of a century, and both are proprietors. Ask these men whether Mr. Greeley understands anything about business. There is not a paper-miller in Manayunk who understands the paper market better than the farmer of Chappaqua. All Radicals are conservative somewhere. Mr. Greeley's conservation is in finance. He is a great believer in thrift, economy, debt-paying and money-saving. He long ago found the philosopher's stone—"pay as you go." The only reason he is not a millionaire is because of his unbridled generosity. He turns nobody empty away. But he has business tact and administrative judgment of the same shrewd kind which judgment of the same shrewd kind which

characterized Benjamin Franklin.

Another current absurdity about him is that, while he is an honest man himself, he is surrounded by a coterie of knaves. Mr. Greeley habitually associates with the best men and women of his time. Editors, lawyers, senawomen of his time. Editors, lawyers, sena-tors, judges, governors—from all parts of the country—these are the people who daily seek him, and with whom he eats and drinks. Of course a newspaper office keeps an open gate to all comers, and as Mr. Greeley is the most to all comers, and as Mr. Greetey is the most accessible of men, very many schemers and charlatans and rogues enter with the rest, salutiog him and receiving in return his self-absorbed and half-recognizing nod; but anybody who imagines that Mr. Greeley has not a disciplined and penetrating instinct for char-acter makes as great a mistake as in supposing that, when he goes to sleep in church, he does not hear the sermon. We have known Mr. Greeley to sleep through a long speech, and then at its close rise and reply to it, point for point. In like manner, through the same gentle oblivion which some people fancy resis upon his judgment of men, there is a wakefulness of scrutiny which detects the scoundrel at a glance. In this sort of insight he reminds

us of Abraham Lincoln.

Another of the fallacies is that he is given to Another of the languages is that Mr. Greeley is free from blundering. But it must be remembered that the editor of a daily paper is necessarily a frequent blunderer. No matter who the man is, if he publicly prints his opinion three bundred and sixty-five times a year, he three hundred and sixty-live times a year, he will inevitably be wrong sometimes—nay, often. Another person may wait till his judgment of a case ripens, but an editor must express his judgment without waiting. This is the exigency of his profession. The foremost man in it is not free from the law which includes all its votaries in this common infirmity of misjudgment. But put any other man on such a rostrum as the Tribune, and bid him more that days in the week for thirty years. speak six days in the week for thirty years, and count his blunders during that time. Who would have done better than Mr Greeley? Noy, who could have done so well? Then, too, even where he has failed, his "failings have leaned to virtue's side." He has never have leaned to virtue's side." He has never blundered into enriching his private pockets. He has never stumbled into the public treasury with grasping and grabing hands. He has never tripped by happy accident into the county courthouse, lined with purple carpets and golden chairs. His chief blunders have been against himself, and not against his countries of the purple of the purple of the purple carpets and golden chairs. Another of the popular caprices is that he is not a safe man. This is a vague and indefinite indictment. If it means that the Federal government would be unsteady in his hands—that he would have one policy to-day and another to-morrow—nothing could be further from the truth. Mr. Greeley is as steadfast in his intellectual judgments as he is in his moral convictions. Fickleness does not belong to his nature. His sincerity, his earnestness, his straightforwardness—all these qualities are as patent as the sunshine to all who know him well enough to know anything of the movements of his mind. He would be as saie, as well enough to know anything of the more ments of his mind. He would be as sale, as prudent, as conservative a President as ever sat in the Executive chair; his administration would deal pre-eminently with the busicess interests and practical development of the country; he would have the grandest cabinet professional produce; and his ministration with profession and produce; and his ministration with the profession of the country has been provided by the profession of the country has been provided by the profession of the profes that the nation could produce; and his minis ters and all their under officers would be ex pected to work about eighteen hours out of the twenty-lour-under the tireless example of their chief, who is one of the hardest working of "the sons of toli."—Golden Age.
