BLACKVILLE, June 12. Quite a number of flourishing little towns have sprung up in the course of a few years on the line of the South Carolina Railroad, between Branchville and Augusta. There is Bamberg, Grahams, Blackville, Williston, Windsor and Graniteville. I should have inclu-Windsor and Graniteville. I should have included Aiken in the above category were I not afraid that its good citizens would have considered me insulting. Blackville, however, was somewhat larger before the war than it is now. Forty-six buildings in It were burnt by Sherman, but many of them have not been rebuilt up to this time. Now, however, that the place has received considerable importance by the removal of the courthouse from Barnwell, a number of new buildings are value up. The new courthouse is a neat brick going up. The new courthouse is a neat brick bulling, two stories high, with a spacious court-room on the second floor. It was built court-room on the second moor. It was built under the immediate supervision of the county officers, at a cost of little more than seven thousand dollars. The lowest bid made by regular contractors was thirty-two thousand dollars. Arrangements are now being made regular contractors was thirty-two thousand dollars. Arrangements are now being made to erect a juil under the same economical management. The prisoners are now confined at Barnwell, ten mices distant, and the sheriff is compelled to entail upon the county the expense of transporting them hither and keeping them under suitable guard during each term of the court. Barnwell is much more blessed than her sister countles in having honest officials. The county is out of debt, and her some money in the treasury besides. blessed than her sister counties in laving honest officials. The county is out of debt, and has some money in the treasury besides. Judge Farmer, whom your readers will remember as having succeeded to this bench on the death of Judge Platt, held his last term of county here during the latter part of May. He resigns his seat to Judge Maner, of Barnwell. The new judge is very popular about here. His election seems to have given general satisfaction. Speaking of judges and courts, brings to mind an instance of Executive elemency on record at this courthouse. During the February term of the Circuit Court, about twenty negroes, with a leader named William Nunus, were tried for riot. A jury of white and black men brought in a verdict of guilty against the whole number. Judge Farmer left a sealed sentence, to be opened at a specified time. His Excellency having had his attention attracted to the case, forthwith sent a pardon for each and every man of them, which arrived before the sentence was opened. Upon opening the sealed sentence it was found to condemn three to imprisonment and discharge the rest. nn three to imprisonment and dis-

to condemn three to imprisonment and discharge the rest.


