Condition and Prospects of the Town-Value of Property-The Highland Park Hotel-The Fruit and Grain

[FROM OUR TRAVELLING CORRESPONDENT.] AIKEN, Jone 22.

Crops.

"The prospects of our little town are exceedingly bright," remarked a prominent citizen of Aiken to me this morning; and this opinion seems to be born of facts. The town has certainly been greatly improved since the close of the war. Charming cottages and elegant villas have sprung up on every hand; and in no part of the State does real estate command better prices. A good house with one to three acres of ground will sell readily for ten to fifteen thousand dollars. The residences generally partake of the attractive and airy cottage style, which has grown so much into popular favor of late years—a style which admits of every conceivable shape. The town is clean and neat, fresh paint being abundant. but is not compactly bullt. Only a very small point can be seen from any one point; and the stranger is continually surprised on his rambles to find elegant dwellings hidden behind clusters of trees which he supposed were be-

clusters of trees. which he supposed were beyond the ilraits.

Probably more boarding-houses are to be found in Alken than in other towns of its size in the Scathern country. Nearly every family "takes boarders." Good board is from two dollars and half to five dollars per day. A very large proportion of the best residences are owned hy wealthy Northerners. The number of visitors increases every year. All have now left for the summer. The visitors book of the Alken reading-room shows within a fraction of seventeen hundred entries from November 1st. 1871, to April 1st, 1872; a largof the Aiken reading-room shows within a fraction of seventeen hundred entries from November 1st, 1871, to April 1st, 1872; a larger number than for any previous year. The finest building in Aiken is the Highland Park Hotel; it stands on a high hill at the western end of the town. The ground plan is T shaped, about four hundred feet front, by two hundred deep. It has a basement, two stories and a half, two piazzas extending the entire length of the front, and a neat little cupola on the centre. It contains one hundred and twenty rooms, all told. The panels of the doors, walnscotling, &c., are of native yellow pine, highly polished. The entire cost of the ground, building and furniture is, in round numbers, one hundred thousand dollars. The view from the cupola is magnificent. At the foot of the hill on which the hotel stands is the track of the South Carolina Raliroad, while stretching beyond to the south and west for twenty to thirty miles is a chain of hills covered with dense forests of pine, which, under the sunlight, display every shade of green, from the lightest to the darkest. This institution is said to have netted the proprietors thirty thousand dollars during the past season. I have it from good authority, that every room on the first floor has already been engraed for the next season. It is now closed for the summer. The proprietors are two in number, citizens of Connecticut. They advertise by selling photographs of the building to the guests, at prices varying according to size, from twenty-five cents to two dollars. The Mayor of Aiken is a Northern man, the former proprietor of the "Aiken Hotel. He left for some point North about a month since. THE TAXES ON TOBACCO.

Dealers in and Manufacturers of Tobucco.

The table of internal revenue taxes imposed by the law of June 6, 1872, printed in THE News of Monday, contained several errors in the sections relating to dealers in and manufacturers of to bacco. As much of the law itself as deals with these occupations is printed in fall, viz:

In full, viz:

Retail dealers in leaf tobacco shall each pay five hundred dollars, and if their annual sales exceed one thousand dollars, shall each pay, in addition thereto, fifty cents for every dollar in excess of one thousand dollars of their sales. Every person shall be, regarded as a retail dealer in leaf-tobacco whose business it is to sell leaf-tobacco in quantities less than an original hogshead, case, or, bale; or who shall sell directly to consumers, or to persons other than dealers in leaf-tobacco, who have paid a special tax as such; or to manufacturers of tobacco, snuff or cigars who have paid a special tax; or to persons who purchase original packages for export. Retail dealers in leaf-tobacco shall also keep a book, and enter therein daily their purchases and sales, in a therein daily their purchases and sales, in a form and manner to be prescribed by the commissioner of internal revenue, which book shall be open at all times for the inspection of any revenue officer.

Dealers in tobacco shall each pay five dollars. Every person whose business it is to

lars. Every person whose business it is to sell, or offer for sale, manufactured tobacco, snuff or cigars shall be regarded as a dealer in tobacco, and the payment of a special tax as a wholesale or retail liquor dealer, or the payment of any other special tax, shall not relieve any person who sells manufactured toreneve any person who sells manufactured to-bacco and clears from the payment of this tax: Provided, That no manufacturer of to-bacco, snuff or clears shall be required to pay a special tax as dealer in manufactured to-bacco and clears for selling his own products at the place of manufacture.

Manufacturers of lobacco shall each part to

cturers of tobacco shall each pay ten dollars. Every person whose business it is to manufacture tobacco or snuff for himself, or manufacture tobacco or snuff for himself, or wito shall employ others to manufacture tobacco or snuff, whether such magulacture shall be by cutting, pressing, grinding, crushing or rubbing of any raw or leaf tobacco, or otherwise preparing raw or leaf tobacco, or otherwise preparing raw or leaf tobacco, or manufactured or partially manufactured tobacco or snuff, or the putting up for use or consumption of scraps, waste, clippings, stems or deposits of tobacco resulting from any process of handling tobacco, shall be regarded as a manufacturer of tobacco.

Manufacturers of cigars shall each pay ten

Manufacturers of cigars shall each pay ten dollars. Every person whose business it is to make or manufacture cigars for himself, or make or manufacture cigars for himself, or who shall employ others to make or manufacture cigars, shall be regarded as a manufacturer of cigars. No special tax receipt shall be issued to any manufacturer of cigars until he shall have given the bond required by law. Every person whose business it is to make cigars for others, either for pay, commission, on shares, or otherwise. from material inraished ares, or otherwise, from material furnished by others, shall be regarded as a cigar-maker. Every cigar-maker shall cause his name and residence to be registered, without previous demand, with the assistant assessor of demand, with the assistant assessor of the avision in which such cigar-maker shall be employed; and any manufacturer of cigars employing any cigar-maker who shall have neglected or refused to make such registry, the long conviction, be ined five dollars for on the first of September next, glected or refused to make such registry, shall, on conviction, be fined five dollars for each day that such cigar-maker so offending, by neglect or refusal to register, shall be em-ployed by him.
