Bales of County Property to Begin next Six Colored Prisoners Take French Tuesday.

The sale of the city property advertised to be sold for non-payment of taxes under the act of the last Legislature, which became a law March 12, 1872, is now nearly completed, and the sale of the property of delinquent taxpayers in Charleston County, outside of the city is expected to commence next Tuesday. The preliminary publication of the names and property of such delinquents has already been commenced in THE NEWS, and they make a formidable list of real estate to be brought under the auctioneer's hammer. The list is, however, still open for revision and correction of any mistakes that may have been made, and an opportunity is still afforded for the owners to prevent the sacrifice of their property by settling their taxes with the additional costs that have accrued. There is no doubt that the sales will be made and they will be positive, the new law upon the subject allowing the county officers no option in the matter, and requiring them to give a warranty deed to each purchaser, and, although the sales of city property thus far have hardly been attended at all, and have provoked little or no speculative competition, there can be little doubt that with the present organization of every branch of the State government the sales thus made will be held to be binding and the deeds perfectly valid in the eyes of the law.


