

THE DELINQUENT TAX SALES.

Sale of County Property to Begin next Tuesday.

The sale of the city property advertised to be sold for non-payment of taxes under the act of the last Legislature, which became a law March 12, 1872, is now nearly completed, and the sale of the property of delinquent taxpayers in Charleston County, outside of the city, is expected to commence next Tuesday.

The preliminary publication of the names and property of such delinquents has already been commenced in THE NEWS, and they make a formidable list of real estate to be brought under the auctioneer's hammer.
