

few self-willed men. And believing that the Republican party is not to be tampered with by the county chairman, nor to be bartered away for a price."

It will be seen that in the language of Sir Lucius O'Trigger, "it is a very pretty quarrel as it stands." The Bowenites are to meet on the 8th instant to elect their delegates, and the Mackeyltes are to follow sult on the 9th. The friends of Mr. Bowen claim that they will have an advantage by electing their men on the first night, and then, by throwing their whole strength again into the camp of the enemy on the second night, electing them over again; and hey claim that by these tactics they will at least carry five of the eight wards in the city, which, with their admitted strength in the country parishes, will give them the control of the convention. This, however, is only the prospect as seen through Bowen spectacles, and the Mackeyites claim that they will have things all their own way, inasmuch as their primary meetings are called by the direct authority of the county chairman, and therefore are the only "regular" meetings. Both are confident, and all are irreconcilables, and the result must be two county conventions, the only actual struggle being as to which faction shall crowd the other out and compel it to take upon itself the onus of bolting. Then there will also be two delegations to the State convention, and that fact will doubtless percipitate the bolt that seems certain to be made in that body, for the Mackeyites of Charleston are the backbone of the Scott faction, while the Bowenites expect to crystalize unto themselves all the Reform element in the Republican party, which are represented by such men as Orr. Corbin and the other Radical Reformers, and which are said to be supported by President Grant and the national administration. This story, however, of Grant's supporting Governor Orr and his adherents, in their attacks upon the Scott Bing, is emphatically denied by many politicians in this State, who ought to know something about it, and it is very probable that Grant, while he is happy enough to be represented as discountenancing the frauds of the Scott administration in South Carolina, for the sake of effect at the North, will still be found sticking to what is called the "regular" party in this State for the sake of its Presidential vote, whoever they nominate for State officers-This appears to be the condition of affairs in regard to the approaching conventions, and in the meantime active and anxious caucussing is in progress, the campaign goes bravely on, and the candidates are as plenty as blackberries, or to use a current and perhaps not inapt quotation, "as thick as thieves." There are just twenty-eight offices in the gift of the people of Charleston County at the approaching election, and for these there are about one hundred and forty-three candidates, and it is not a very good season for candidates either. Below are given the names of a good many of of the most prominent, and the list might be indefinitely extended by including the smaller
