PARALLELS FOR THE FAMOUS TICH-BORNE CASE.

Two Men Hanged for One Man's Crime -Even a Mother Deceived by a Fellow Pretending to be her Long-Lost

The universal interest which has attached to the famous Tichborne case, in which a vulgar butcher laid claim to one of the largest estates and most noble titles of England, and in which the discomfiture of the claimant, after a protracted trial, has in no way discouraged him from preparing for another attempt on a larger scale, has had the effect of bringing out numerous reminiscences of remarkable cases of mistaken identity. Aside from the romantic elements in this case, and the always ready popular sympathy for one in humble life who claims to have been kept out of his own and is for it, the notable point is that it iurnishes one of the most remarkable cases of disputed personal indentity on record. Such cases es an interest for the public.

THE WRONG MAN HANGED. The annals of crime furnish many instances in which the identity of persons arrested and charged with offence has been proved by apparently conclusive testimony, yet the persons so proved guilty have afterward been found wholly innocent, and the witnesses all mistaken in the man. In 1796 a gentleman named Lesurques was tried, convicted and hanged at Partitor highway robbery, no less than four witnesses testifying to his identify. Other witnesses were brought forward to prove an allbi, but one of these having been detected in a falsity, the jury refused to believe all, and brought the prisoner in guilty. The young man went to the scallold protesting his innocence. Four years afterward the real crimi-The annals of cri ne furnish many instances cence. Four years afterward the real crimi-nal-one Duboscq, was arrested, and found to possess a marvellous personal likeness to Les-urques. Evidence of a conclusive character was produced against him, and he was hanged, an accomplice testilying to his guilt and to the entire innocence of Lesurques. A YOUNG MAN'S ESCAPE.

In 1845 a singular case of mistaken identity occurred in a trial at Lowell, Massachusetts. Some wretch had assaulted little girls picking berries in the fields near that city, and a young man was arrested two weeks after. A Mr. Houghton and his wife, who had run to the resone, of the girls on hearing their screams. resone of the giris on hearing their societies, awore positively that the prisoner was the same man who had run away in the bushes at the time of the assault. The two girls were taken separately in a room, and each of them pointed out the prisoner as the fellow who committed the assault upon them. Other witnesses, to the number of ten in all, swore to be defaults with a man whom they had witnesses, to the number of ten in all, swore to his identity with a man whom they had seen on the day before the crime near the spot. On the other hand, the prisoner proved most conclusively that at the time of the outrage he was in a remote town in another State, and the real criminal was afterward found and punished. But the remarkable reamblance of the prisoner to the villain who semblance of the prisoner to the villain who had committed the crime, and the fact that the witnesses for the government who identi-fied him were all mistaken, caused the judge who tried the case to remark that it was almost sufficient to shake all confidence in human testimony. KILLING THE FATTED CALF FOR THE WRONG

PRODIGAL. A case more nearly resembling the Tichborne

claimant, being that of a lost son returning to his parents' house, and recognized and believed in as their true son, while all the time an impostor, occurred at Bangor, Maine, in 1849. The claimant in this case was a young man twenty-iour years of age, named Luther Hause, a wild fellow, son of Luther Hause, of Troy, Maine, who had worked at Bangor for two or three years as a common laborer. He imposed upon the family of James Hause (to wnom neither he nor his father was related) imposed upon the iamily of James Hause (to whom neither he nor his father was related) by claiming to be their long lest son, and obtained from them money and clothing to a considerable amount, for which suit was finally brought against him. On coming to their house, the imposter addressed Mr. Hause as "father," and then turned to Mrs. Hause, threw his arms about her neck and kissed her, saying: "How do you do, mother?" Mrs. H. did not at first believe that it was her son. His eyes and hair were different in color, and his complexion differed still more widely. In speaking to Luther, she said: "Is it possible that this is my long-lost son Rowland?" He answered, "Yes, mother, it is me." She then said to him: "If you are my son you have got a scar on your knee." He pulled up his pants and showed a scar on his breast, that was burnt in Mr. Andrew's shop." He pulled away, his shirt bosom and showed a scar on his breast. She then said: "My son Rowland had a scar on his beck, under his see." He beld up his peck and showed a scar. Rowland had a scar on his neck, under ear." He held up his neck and showed a scar in that place on his neck. She then said: "One of my son's toes lapped over the other." He said, "One of mine is so." Mrs. Hause asked him to show her the room where he use to sleep. He went uj stairs to the room where her son slept, and after some hesitation threw himself upon a bed standing in the room and said: "This is my old bed." Mr. Hause and his wife were then fully satisfied that he was their son, and provided him with clothes, &c. He remained af their house some five mouths, and the longer he stayed the more they were satisfied he was their son. "One of mine is so." Mrs. Hause

SCARS MADE TO ORDER.

A daughter of Mr. James Hause testified that she kept school at Brewer, (opposite Bangor.) and that she did not at first know the defendant when he called to see her. Doubting his identity, she said to him: "If you are my brother, you have a scar on the head, where I hurt you when you were a little boy." Sie then felt of his head and found a scar, and became satisfied that he was her lost brother. She so testified before the court.

Several of the neighbors of Mr. Hause took this young man to be Rowland Hause. Young men who had been school-mates with Rowland, talked with Luther about past times, and became convinced that he was Rowland Hause.

and became convinced that he was kowland Hause.

On the other side, there were several doubtinf dircumstances connected with the young
man, which led the father and mother to feel
continued uncertainty about their putative
son. And one day there came over to Corinna a Mr. Dow, who positively recognized the
youth as Luther Hause, who belonged to Troy.
Mr. Thomas Gardiner also told Hause that he
recognized the young man as Luther Hause,
having lived near his father seventeen years,
and been very familiar with him. Mr. James
Hause now became so stirred up that he determined to settle the question of identity pubkely, and took out a warrant against Luther
for obtaining goods on false pretences. He
was arrested, and Mr. Seth Hause, of Troy,
being summoned, appeared at the trial, and
there recognized the prisoner as his son.

WHE JUDGMENT OF THE POPULACE. That was the end of the case. But the trial created unexampled interest; over four hundred persons were present, and apparently the usiority of them were in favor of Luther, believer him to be the long-lost boy Rowland. But the judge was too close-sighted not to give its due weight to such positive evidence of non-identity, and sustained the warrant. The sovereign mob, on the adjournment of the court, hustled the prisoner out of the way, and although he was alterward tried ment of the court, nustrea the prisoner out of the wey, and although he was afterward tried and found gullty of procuring money on false pretences, it was shown that Esquire Hause and his wife, who had so credulously believed in his identity with their lost son (afterwards bond in California,) were much to blame for suffering themselves to be so easily duped.


