The English iron-clad Warrior passed hours 45 m ates, and the Hebe in 12 hours. respective classes in the world. An average of 100 vessels a month now pass through, and the canal is equal to the transit of 500 a month, so that it is not necessary to deepen or widen the canal in any respect in order to accommodate all the vessels that are likely to want to pass through it for a hundred years to come. From the inauguration of the canal to Jane 30, 1872, a total of 1847 vessels, measuring 1,812,814 tons, passed

from one sea to the other. At the commencement of the present half year, July 1, the basis of levying tolls was changed and a tariff on the gross tonnage was adopted. This change gave rise to much controversy, but the English Government finally admitted its legality. It will add from 40 to 50 per cent. to the receipts.
