All this is repeated over and over again in a thousand forms, with an intensity, a reckless devilishness, and an utter disregard of truth, which words could never parallel Harper & Brothers coin money by circulating his pictured falsehoods and slanders. Northern people welcome them with delight, believe them, act up to them; and in New York, a city full of hot-blooded Irishmen, Thomas Nast goes about year after year with an unbroken head upon his irresponsible shoulders.
