Still Great French Metropolis Revering Its Former Prosperity. A correspondent writing to the Baltimore

American says of Paris: American says of Paris:

The work of restoring all the palaces and buildings destroyed by the Commune and repairing all the damage inflicted by the war!s steadily progressing. The walls of the palaces all stood firm, and even the Hotel de Ville will soon show no trace of the destroyer. ands of workmen are everywhere Thousands of workmen are everywhere engaged in the work of reconstruction, and the Column Vendome will soon commence to rise again, the base of which is carefully railed in again and made ready for sustaining the restored column

Public buildings are also being erected in various parts of the city. The Column of July, which was damaged by the mob, is scaffolded and thronged with workmen from base to statue, and the damage done to the Triumphal Arch by German shells has already been repaired. New statuary is being erected in the Place de la Concorde, the Bols de Boulogne is resuming its former attractions, and the Champs Elysees was never more bright and gay than at the present time. The theatres are all open and crowded with visitors, and the Boulevards at hight, for miles in all directions, are thronged with people, and the stores and cafes brilliant with gas jets reflected from the countless mirrors which cover their interior walls.

The Academy of Music, at the juncture of the Boulevard Capuchines and the Rue de la Public buildings are also being erected in

The Academy of Music, at the Juncture of the Boulevard Capuchines and the Rue de la Paix, which has been in course of construction for six years, is not yet finished. This will be the greatest structure of the kind in the world, its front being not less than 300 feet. 

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
