Sad Story of Veronica Izzo-Desperate Death-Struggle in the Bay of Genoa-A Double Execution.

On the 24th of July, the ancient City of Parma, in Italy, was the scene of a double execution, to which the peculiar circumstances under which it took place, and the fact that the culprits that were beheaded were husband and wife, the latter a woman of pressing appearance, gave it an unusually horrible aspect.

Their names were Jacob and Anselma Beh-Their names were Jacob and Anselma Behrendsohn. They were of German extraction, and had come to Parma four years before, seemingly in prosperous circumstances. Jacob, the husband, was a man about forty years of age, and his wife, Anselma, a tall, handsome brunette, with flashing black eyes and exquisite shaped hands and feet, only twenty-six. Jacob Behrendsohn had opened in one of the sphurbs of Parma a large millingry shop. the suburbs of Parma a large millinery shop, in which he employed about a dozen young girls. The Parmesan women are noted for their extraordinary beauty, even those be-longing to the lowest classes of society being generally tall, of fair faces, luxuriant hair, and uncommonly graceful bearing. So M. Behrendsohn's employees were mostly very pretty girls. It was noticed, however, that the handsomest of them frequently left his establishment after being with him only a few days. They told the girls who remained that Mr. Behrendsohn had kindly obtained them more lucrative situations at Leghorn, Genoa or Marselles, in which cities he had wealthy relatives in the same line of business. Most of the girls in Italian inland cities, who obtain places far from home, can neither read nor write, and so their relatives hear from them rarely and at long intervals.

Both Behrendsohn and his handsome wile frequently made brief trips to the sea-shore, and returned always seemingly in the happiest mood. They were liberal to the poor of the city, they treated their girls well, and everybody spoke highly of them. No one suspected their true character, much less that they were to end their lives a few years alterward on the scaffold, by the hands of the public executioner.

When the truth finally became known-

When the truth finally became known—when it was discovered by what terrible means these fiends incarnate had amassed the money which they had spent so freely, and apparently for respectable purposes, and what a frightful fate they had prepared for their poor, innocent victims—there was an outburst of horror, such as Parma has never witnessed before, and the jail of the city, where they were confined, had to be guarded day and night by a strong military force.

In the latter part of December, 1871, a young man called at Behrendsohn's shop, and said he wished to have a position for his sister, a sweet-looking, girl of eighteen, with long golden hair and the face of one of Raphael's Madonnas. Veronica 1220 was her name, and Behrendsohn immediately engaged her services at a salary much higher than was usually paid to milliner girls at Parma, and two or three days afterwards he said she might two or three days afterwards he said she might do still better at Genoa, where she might obtain a situation at double the wages. He offered to accompany her to that place himself. She agreed to follow him, and, a week or two afterward, the two were in the superbold city of the Dorias. Behrendsohn proposed to Veronica to have a ride with him in the bay, which she joyinly accepted. They entered a barge and were rowed out to the sea. No sooner, however, were they about five hundred yards from the shore than Behrendsohn and one of the oarsmen pounced upon the unsuspecting girl and tried to gag and bind her. She succeeded in freeing herself their grasp, and, selzing a large kulfe two or three days afterwards he said she might

Behrendsohn then tried to push her overboard, but she clung to the barge with desperate energy, and it was not until they had stunned her by striking her with the oars that she finally sunk into the water. It was about dusk, and no one had noticed the terrible tragedy that had been enested in the beautiful bay.

But one of those curious accidents which happen rarely, prevented the consummation of the foul murder. Veronica was picked up a few minutes atterwards by a fisherman, who sailed past the spot in a frail craft where ahe was floating. After rubbing her tenderly and giving her a few drops of Cognac, he succeeded in restoring her to consclousness. But the poor gir swooned away again, and she was still senseless when the kind-hearted fisherman landed with her on the quay. What should he do with her? He called a policeman, and the two carried the unconsclous girl to the Hospital of San Geronimo, where a doctor examined her and dressed the large wound in her skull. She remained a week at the hospital, but her reason seemed to have been impaired by the terrible blows she had received on her head. To all inquiries as to where she was from, and who had treated her so brutally, she gave the most absurd answers. Behrendsohn's card, however, was found in her pocket; and so, after the wound was healed, the Jew of Parma was written to, and on the following day he himself appeared at the hospital and took poor Veronica away in a closed carriage, saying that she was a crazy niece of his wife's, and was in the habt of ranning away from home. Upon returning with her to Parma, the Jew and his wife took her into the cellar of their house, and, after the vone before her body was c

hy to death, and Behrendsohn thereupon dug a hole in the ground and interred her in it, even before her body was cold.

Now, what had caused him and his wife to pursue this atrocious course toward the beautiful girl? He had for years engaged in the business of selling attractive young women to the villains who take them to Tripoli, Tunis and Alexandria, and receive there a very high price for them from the proprietors of large harems. The Italian Government has been very remiss in trying to suppress this nefarious traffic, which is constantly carried on between the seaports of Leghorn and Genoa and the African coast, with unparallelled boldness the African coast, with unparallelled boldness and almost entire impunity. The slave-deal-ers cruise between these ports and the African coast, and such scoundrels as Behrendsohn supply them liberally with human merchan-dise. The fate that awaits the girls in Africa

dise. The fate that awaits the girls in Africa is too horrible to describe.

On the night of the assault upon Veronica izzo, the Jew had two of his confederates in the barge. They intended to take her to an African goesette, which was lying outside the port. Well aware of the terrible punishment that awaited him and his accomplices, in case their crime should be discovered, they had attempted to murder their victim rather than let her escape. Hearing that she was in Genoa at the hospital, he had gone to her, as was clearly proven on the trial, for the purpose of murdering her. His wife had sent the servants out of the house at the time when he was expected to go back with her, and had everything in readiness for putling her to death.

Two days afterward a servant girl of Behrendsohn's noticed that her master was digging late at night in the cellar. He was trying to cover the spot where the senseless within had poured out her life-blood. The discovery seemed so extraordinary to her that she told her lover about it, who, having a spite against the Jew, informed the police of Behrendsohn's suspicious movements. An examination took place, the cellar was searched, and it did not take the authorities long to discover the horribly disfigured remains of the murdered girl.

Behrendsohn and his wife were at once arrested, and the latter, hoping to save her life by a free confession, unfolded to the examining judge all the crimes of which she and her husband had been guilty. He himself denied for a long time that he was guilty; but finally admitted all. They were sentenced to be beheaded on the 25th of July. Anselma behaved like a raving maniac when she heard of her doom. She threw herself on the ground and yelled in the shrillest tones for mercy. Her husband was more callous. In the night, after the sentence had been passed upon him, Behrendsohn tried to hang himself in his dungeon; but was in time prevented from committing suicide.

When the guilty couple were led out to the scaffold, which was surrounded by a concaurse of perhaps ten thousand excited spectators, the air was rent by cries of horror and overestion.

Anselms looked very beautiful in her close fitting white dress, although her hair had been cut off by the executioner, and her cheeks were unnaturally flushed. She was taken from the cart on which she had been conveyed to the scaffold, and when she befield the headsman who was waiting for her there at the fatal block, with the huge frashing axe in his right hand, she lifted her arms to heaven and murmured something which even those who were closest to her were unable to understand. In Italy they dispatch criminals very quickly, and so the beautiful murderess had not to wait long.

Two officers seized her and dragged her hur-

head on it, and belief she was able to teast the headsman dealt her a terrible blow on the neck. Off rolled the fair head. Two minutes afterwards Bebrendeohn was put to death in the same manner. He was almost stolld in his despair, and was unable to walk from the cart up the steps of the scaffold.



In purvuance of an Act of the General Assembly approved March 1, 1870, entitled, "An act providing for the general erc lon and the manner of coundcting the same," amended by an act approved March 12, 1872, an Election will be held in the several Counties of this State on the THIRD WEDNE-DAY, being the 16th day of October, for the following state. Legislative, County and Congressional Officers, to stive for the next two and four years, as provided by the State Constitution and Acts of Congress of the United States, to wit: Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Attorney-General, Secretary of State State Treasurer, comptrol, the General Superintendent of Education, Adutant and Inspector-General, Members of the General Assembly, Solicitors in the several Judicial Circuits, and for the various County Offices, together with one Member of Congress, to represent the State at Large, and Representives in the respective Congressions; Districts.

At the said election the following amendments to the State Constitution will be submitted to the voters for ratification or rejection, to wit:

1st. Amendment relating to change of time of holding general elections.

1st. Amendment relating to change of t me of holding general elections.

Strike out all of that portion of Section XI of Artice 2, following the words "eighteen hundred and seventy," occurring in the fourth and fifth lines, and insert the following: "And forever thereafter, on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, in every second year, in such manner and at: such places as the Legislature may provide." The manner of voting on this amendment shall be as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment—Yes." Those opposed to said amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment—Yes." Those opposed to said amendment telating to the further increase of the public debt of the State, as follows: Article XVI, "To the end that the public debt of South Carolina may not hereafter belicerased without the due consideration and free consent of the people of the State, the General Assembly is hereby forbidden to create any further debt or obligation, either by the loan of the credit of the Etate, by guarantee, endors ment or otherwise, except for the ordinary and carrent business of the State, without first sabmitting the question as to the creation of any such new debt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of the state young on the question shall be in favor of a further debt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of this credit, none shall be created or made."

Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit
a ballot with the following words written or
printed thereon: "Constitutional Amendment,
Artice XVI.—Yes." Those opposed to the amendment shall cast a llot, with the following words written or print-thereon: "Constitutional Amendment, Article 7I.—No."

All bar-rooms and drinking salcons shall be closed on the day of election; and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on the day of election shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fleed in a sum not less than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for a period not loss than one month, nor more than six months. The Commissioners and Managers of Floction, and each of them, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State touching their duty in such case, to cause such elections to be held in their respective counties on the day aforesaid, and to take all necessary steps for the holding of such elections, and for the sacertaining and determining the persons who shall have been duly elected thereat, according to the rules, principles and provisions prescribed by the act and amendments thereon, aforesaid.

In pursuance whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, the 18th day of September, A. D., 1872, and in the ninety-seventh year of the Independence of the United States of America.
