A RAILROAD COLLISION.

Narrow Escape of the Passengers.

(From the Columbia Union.) Yesterday morning varied rumors were floating about the streets, that a collision befloating about the streets, that a collision between two railroad trains had occurred a short distance below the city, resulting seriously. Our reporter at once followed these rumors up, and proceeding to the depot of the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta road, was through the politeness of Conductor D. L. Fillyaw, whose train was about to leave for Wilmington, enabled to proceed at once to the scene of the disaster, which, happliy, had been much exaggerated in the accounts thereof, and which narrowly escaped being accompanied with loss of life; as it was, a few bruises of slight nature comprised all the inaccompanied with loss of life; as it was, a few bruises of slight nature comprised all the injuries received. The accident occurred at the crossing of the South Carolina and the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta raliroads, about a mile below the city, and from diligent inquiry and examination of the debris, the following appears to be about the true statement of the case, viz:

The South Carolina Raliroad passenger train which deaves under the new schedule time that went into effect Sunday, left the depot and was running at usual speed until

pot and was running at 1831al speed until when about three-quarters of a mile from the depot some cows were discovered upon the track, and brakes were blown down, which circumstance probably saved the lives of the circumstance probably saved the lives of the passengers, as the brakes had just been taken off and speed increased when Conductor William D. Kennedy discovered a timber train backing through the cut on the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Raliroad in the direction of his trein. The conductor at once ordered ot his train. The conductor at once ordered the brakes to be put on sgain, but saw a collision was inevitable, as the timber train, which had been concealed by the cut and shrubbery, and which was running at good speed, was right upon him; yet he hoped to prevent his passenger cars being struck, in which attempt he was successful, but not in preventing the two trains coming in conwhich attempt ne was successful, but not in preventing the two trains coming in con-tact. The damage done was considera-ble. The engine of the South Carolina Railroad train, the James Rose, No. 25, struck Baliroad train, the James Rose, No. 25, struck between the two first cars that appeared—the timber train running backwards, as before stated—demolishing them completely, driving one of them upside down over the high embankment, breaking heavy iron axies, and scattering the lumber in all directions. The process of the passenger train was consider. scattering the itimber in all the tenders the engine of the passenger train was considerably damaged, being thrown from the track, the forward trucks dislodged and broken, the front light broken off, and some of the iron work of the lower part of the engine broken; the engine was thrown over at an angle of about highwaven degrees, and the tender the engine was thrown over at an angle of about thirty-seven degrees, and the tender thrown from the track. None of the carsjof the passenger train were injured to any extent worth mentioning. The engineer, Heury Sigwald, was struck by his machine and received a pretty severe shaking up, but was not seriously injured. The two fitomen jumped of, it is stated, and saved themselves. Conductor Kennedy received a sprain in the leg, and one passenger was seen to start away from and one passenger was seen to start away from the scene limping; and Mr. J. Gibenrath, the express agent, had an elbow bruised. These, express agent, had an elbow bruised. These, so far as we could learn, were all the injuries to limbs. There was but a small number of passengers on the Charleston train. The cut through which the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Baliroad passes, at the point where the accident occurred, is deep, the track is down grade, and the locality altogether a dangerous one. A flag-house stands near by, and it is customary to have a flagman stationed there by the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Raliroad. At the time of the accident he was absent, it is said, from sickness, and, thereabsent, it is said, from sickness, and, therefore, the usual precautionary measures were not taken. It is also stated that the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta trains are obliged to stop short of the South Carolina Railroad which this timber train neglected to do. track, which this timber train neglected to do. That the consequences were not more serious is miraculous, and Conductor Kennedy states is miraculous, and Conductor Aeducay states that had not the speed of his train been checked because of the cows being on the track, it is almost certain that the passenger cars would have been struck by the approaching timber train. We learn that Mr. William Anderson, a very we searn that Mr. William Anderson, a very efficient railroad man, will take the position of general superintendent and master machinist of both the Wilmington and Columbia and Augusta Railroads. This arrangement is made by the Baltimore officials, who control both of these railroads. Mr. William Anderson is well travers.

these railroads. Mr. William Anderson is well known as a former superintendent of the Charlotte and Columbia Railroad. He is an energetic, faithful worker, and thoroughly experienced in railroad matters.

On the 15th of the present month the directors of the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Railroad will meet. Upon that occasion it is said that President Johnston will tender his resignation, after an efficient service of about sixteen years.

As our readers are generally aware, the spirit of consolidation has reached the railroad as well as the political department of the country. Under the influence of this spirit, our railway lines are passing away from local

control.

We take it that, as respects the Wilmington and Columbia. and the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Reads, we must yield gracefully to the sceptre that is held at Baltimore. We can only hope that the general interests, which will no doubt hereafter be consulted, will not be found at variance with those local interests about which we are naturally and reasonably concerned. So far as the stock of the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Road is concerned, the Baltimore control has had a disastrous effect, said stock having fallen below 25. That it will appreciate is, however, the hope and expectation of those concerned.

An Ordinance to repeal an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to prevent the erection of brick

"An Ordinance to prevent the erection of brick and wooden buildings, and to provide greater security against fres."

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Charlesion, in City Council assembled: SECTION I. That an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to prevent the erection of wooden buildings and to provide greater security against fires," ratified the eighth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, be, and the same is hereby repealed, except as to such portions of the City of tharleston as are hereinafter described, to wit: Alliots abutting on the west side of King street, from South Bay to Cathoun street, and all rear lois, the entrances to which are on the said west side of King street; all that territory lying on the east south Bay to Calhoun street, and all rear lots, the entrances to which are on the said west side of King street; all that territory lying on the east side of King street; all that territory lying on the east side of King street; all that territory lying on the east side of King street; and extending northerly as far as Society street, and east of East Say street; also, all that territory lying east of King street, and society street, and easterly to Anson street; all lots abutting on the north side of Society street, from Anson street, running east to Cooper River. including all rear lots with entrance on said Society street. Provide the extention of the lots or territory south of Calhoun street exempted from the operation of the Ordinances of the City of Charleston and Acts of the General Assembly preventing the erection of wooden buildings, shall not be less than two stories in neight, and that all the inner walls of said buildings, including all partitions and ceilings, shall be lathed and plastered. STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

1. ELECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

In pursuance of an act of the General Assembly approved March 1, 1870, eattied, "An act providing for the general sec. ion and the manner of conducting the same," amended by an act approved March 12, 1872, an Election will be held in the several Counties of this State on the THIRD WEDNES-DAY, being the 16th day of October, for the following State, Legislative, County and Congressional Officers, to save for the next two and four years, as provided by the State Constitution and Acts of Congress of the United States, to wite Governor, Licutenant-Governor, Attorney-General, Secretary of State State Treasurer, Comptroller-General, Secretary of State State Treasurer, Comptroller-General, Superintendent of Education, Adjustant and Inspector-General, Members of the General Assembly, Solicitors in the several Judicial Circuits, and for the various County Offices, together with one Member of Congress, to represent the State at Large, and Representives in the respective Congressions Districts.

At the said election the following amendments to the State Constitution will be submitted to the voters for ratification or rejection, to wit:

1st. Amendment rolating to change of time of holding general elections.

Strike out all of that portion of Section XI of Article 2, following the wirds 'eighteen hundred and seventy,' occurring in the fourth and fifth lines, and insert the following: "And forever thereafter, on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, in every second year, in such manner and at such places as the Legislature may provide." Amendment relating to the further increase of the public debt of the State, as follows: Article XVI, "fo the end that the public debt of South Carolina may not hereafter be increased without the due cousideration and free consent of the people of the State, the General Assembly is hereor forbidden to create any further debt or obliga by forbidden to create any further debt or obligation, either by the loan of the credit of the state,
by guarantee, endors ment or otherwise, except
for the ordinary and current business of the State,
without first submitting the question as to the
creation of any such new debt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of the credit, to the people of
this State, at a general election; and unless twothirds of the qualified voters of this State voting
on the question shall be in favor of a further debt,
guarantee, endorsement or loan of this credit,
none shall be created or made."

Those opposed to the amendment shall cast a ballot, with the following words written or printed hereon: "Constitutional Amendment, Article XVI.—No." AVI.—No."

All bar-fooms and drinking salcons shall be cloved on the day of election; and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on the day of election shall be justify of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not less than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for a period not less than one month, nor more than six months. The Commissioners and Managers of Floction, and each of them, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State touching their duty in such case, to cause such elections to be held in their respective counties on the day sloresald, and to take all necessary steps for the holding of such elections, and for the ascertaining and determining the persons who shall have been duly elected thereat, according to the rules, principles and provisions prescribed by the act and amendments thereon, aforesaid.

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
