THE CITADEL SQUARE CHURCH. Call of a New Pastor-A Sketch of His Carcer.

The congregation of the Citadel Square Baptist Church in this city have invited the Rev. J. A. Chambilss, late pastor of the Second Baptist Church of Richmond, Va., to take charge of their church. Mr. Chambliss was elected pastor about a month ago, but the call was not formally extended until last Wednesday evening. His parents are South Carolinians, but he is a native of the State of Ala-

bama, and about thirty-three years old. His collegiate studies were pursued at Georgetown College, Kentucky, where he graduated with honor. A short time aiter his graduation, he conceived the idea of studying theology, and, with that view, entered the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, at Greenville, South Carolina. In the year 1860, he completed his course of studies, and left the Institution with renewed honors. During the same year, he married a Miss Mauldin, of Greenville, and assumed charge of the Baptist Church at Sumter, S. C., which charge he re-

tained until the latter part of 1861, when he resigned it for service in the Confederate army. At the close of the war he accepted the call of a small church near Ninety-six, in Newberry County. In 1866 he resigned this for the Bapulst Church at Alken, where he re-

mained one year, and at the same time kept a school. In 1867 he received and accepted the call of the Second Baptist Church of Richmond, Va., which he kept until a short time ago. He is represented as an able man and an eloquent preacher. Besides the call from this city he has recently received two others; one from Kansas City and another from the South Baptist Church of New York City. The call

from Kansas City he has already refused, and his friends in this city are quite hopetnl that he will also refuse that from New York in favor of the one from this city.

THE CROPS .- There was some wet and unsettled weather during this period, but much of the time was dry and favorable for securing the crops. The past week has shown no special feature bearing on the result of the growth, the prospects of the yield remaining without special change, and planters now require dry and modrate weather for crop picking.

THE RECEIPTS .- The arrivals at the colton ports for the week, up to Friday last, were 64,208 bales, against 51,289 bales the previous week, and 34,073 bales for the corresponding period the year before.
